Burglars hit 7 Lakes shops

Seven shops and offices in the Seven Lakes Business Village were broken into in the early hours of Monday morning, by a thief or thieves apparently looking for cash. A \$500 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible.

Four of the shops in Seven Lakes Plaza — Elite Nails, Indigo's, Salon 7, and Peking Wok, — filed reports with the Moore County Sheriff's Office, as did Carolina Virginia Building Consortium, which has an office in the Plaza. Inexplicably, Curves, located between two of the shops that were broken into, was not entered.

The Property Center, located just in front of the shopping plaza, was hit, as was The Gorenflo Law Firm, located on Seven Lakes Court on the other side of NC Highway 211.

According to reports filed by Sheriff's Deputies Jeffery Myrick and Michael Kantorowski, the perpetrators rifled through cash registers, desks, and file cabinets. In all, \$1,340 in cash was reported stolen from five businesses, and a computer and carrying case — valued at \$3,500 — was taken from the Property Center. In addition, some businesses suffered property damage from the break-ins.

Detective James Threadgill, who is working the case for the Sheriff's Office, told *The Times* the crimes were likely committed very late Sunday night or very early Monday morning, between midnight and 3:00 am. He said a large screwdriver and

'Club's mind was made up'

There's yet another volley in the public back-and-forth between Seven Lakes Country Club [SLCC] and the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] over a new driving range the Club plans to build this summer.

But the two sides also have an appointment to meet with their respective attorneys on May 24, with a goal of moving toward a resolution of the conflict.

During a May 16 SLLA Work Session, Director Michael Florence read a statement rebutting claims made in a letter from SLCC President Dick Weber to SLLA President Don Truesdell that was published in the May 11 edition of *The Seven Lakes Times*. Florence was part of a negotiating group that was attempting to reach an agreement with the club earlier this year, before March elections realigned

the membership of the SLLA Board. [The full text of Florence's statement appears at the end of this article.]

"It was clear to me last year, as it is clear to me now, that the Club is going to try and do whatever the Club wants to," Florence wrote. He says the negotiating group of which he was a member, "never had a official compromise worked out

They did, however, return the issue to the Planning Board for further study. Subsequently, the Planning Board asked the Planning staff to schedule a public hearing on the issue.

This important meeting will be held Thursday, May 31 at the Agricultural Center on Pinehurst Avenue in Carthage. The public is encouraged to drop in at 5:00 pm to study maps and pictures of the proposed developments in Area A. Beginning at 6:00 pm the Planning Board and Planning staff will make brief statements and then listen to comments from the public.

Your comments — whether for or against a moratorium — are very important to the Planning



the Planning Board reached a consensus on requesting a sixmonth moratorium on major subdivisions (those of five or more lots)

The rationale for a moratorium includes

• The three Area A committees

Preservation/Conservation, Growth Management, and Infrastructure — are actively working on proposals for the future of Area

A. Their proposals will be integrated and prioritized into an Area A plan. Our goal is to complete this work over the next six or seven months.


 Individually and collectively the proposed developments raise a number of critical issues that must be fully addressed in the Area A plan and, in many cases, strongly suggest or even require modifying today's land use plan and a number of zoning ordinances.

- Collectively, these developments represent the greatest challenge the Planning Department has faced since they worked out the 1999 Land Use Plan and Zoning Ordinances.
- In the eight years since the Land Use Plan and Zoning Ordinances were adopted, Moore County has experienced change and considerable growth. The initiation of Small Area Planning provides a great opportunity for updating both.

In summary, a viable, forward looking plan for Area A needs what a moratorium can provide — the time to focus our attention

No easy fix for lightning-damaged back gate

A lightning strike that took out the electronics at the back gate to Seven Lakes West on May 13 sparked some additional fireworks at the May 22 General Meeting of the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA].

President Jim Haggard, reporting for Blaine Rowland, who was absent, explained that the Board had considered three options for repairing the back gate:

- 1. repair the existing transponder system at a cost of \$14,000;
- replace it with a barcode system like that at the gates of Seven Lakes North and South at a cost of \$47,000; and
- investigate the various entry system options and put the job out for competitive bid.

The board decided on Option 1, but, Haggard said, learned on Tuesday afternoon that the damage to the gate system — and the cost of repair — was more extensive than was originally thought. The cost of repairing the transponder system may now be as high as replacing it with a barcode system. In addition, the Board has learned that the transponder system — which is difficult to maintain — is obsolete.

As a result the board will be meeting again to reconsider its options, Haggard told landowners. At least some of the cost of repairing or replacing the system will be covered by the Association's insurance policy, Haggard said. Insurance committee member Bill Price explained that the Board will need to work with insurance company adjusters as they decide what course of action to take.

As for what to do until the gate is repaired, Haggard said the Board could close the gate or leave it open but had decided on a middle course of action "so that no one will be satisfied." The gate will be left open from 6:00 am until 10:00 pm and closed overnight. Signs announcing the policy will be put into place in the next few days.

Several residents expressed concerns that it was taking too long to repair the gate and that, meanwhile, the community's security is being jeopardized by the problem.

One resident noted that the security problem was exacerbated by the fact that it would be reported in the newspaper. Haggard said the Board understood that concern but, "on the other

hand, felt it would be inappropriate to keep this information from you people."

Several residents offered suggestions for resolving the issue; chief among them was the idea that the back gate should be manned during the hours that it is left open. Haggard said the Board had considered, but rejected, that idea because of (See "West side," p. 38)

SLLA Board will consider ban on big trucks

A vote on whether to ban tractor-trailers and other heavy trucks from overnight parking in Seven Lakes North and South is scheduled for the Wednesday, May 30, Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] General Meeting, along with several other proposed changes to Association rules and regulations.

Security Director Michael Florence proposed the truck ban during the Wednesday, May 16 SLLA Board work session. His resolution reads as follows: "Effective upon a vote of the SLLA Board no overnight parking of any kind will be allowed for tractor trailers in Seven Lakes North and South. This includes truck parking without a trailer. It would also include wreckers of any type, commercial dump trucks, flatbed trailers and any type of car, horse, aircraft, boat or truck hauler. Admission within the community is allowed but not for any overnight parking. In the future if land becomes available for overnight parking it may be allowed with restrictions, but not at residential properties."

Side-entry garages

Architectural Review Board [ARB] Chair Donna Stephan suggested a rules revision aimed at reversing a trend toward garages that face the street in new construction. She said her committee had reviewed a number of homes recently in which the garage door constitutes twothirds of the facade of the house visible from the street.

She proposed a rules revision for new construction that would stipulate that "as possible, auto garage entrances will be to the side or the rear." Noting that some lots are too narrow for side-entry garages, she said the ARB would need to be able to exercise discretion in granting waivers to the the requirement.

Stephan also asked that the name of the \$800 fee that contractors must pay in order to build in Seven Lakes North and South be changed from "Seven Lakes Access Fee" to "Plan Review Fee."

Stephan said she was not confident that the Association could deny a builder access to a landowner's property, as is

implied by the current name of the fee.

Wastewater line easements

During its April General Meeting, the SLLA Board denied

requests from Grumpy Pumpkin, LLC, for easements that will allow it to pump wastewater from lots that will not perc to drainage fields in other lots.

President Don Truesdell reported that the the Board had met subsequently with Grumpy Pumpkin principal Clark Campbell and reviewed the SLLA rules governing such septic installations, as well as Campbell's specific plans.

Landowners who had objected to the easements were included in that meeting, and both they and board members left the meeting satisfied that the proposed lines posed no public health risk. The request will come back up for a vote at the May 30 General Meeting, and Truesdell said he hoped it would be approved at that time.

Community Manager Dalton Fulcher noted that the Moore

> Caunty Health Department must sign off on all septic systems, which helps ensure the quality of installations.

Campbell's development plans also call for subdividing some previously combined lots - a procedure laid out in the SLLA legal documents. His resubdivision request will appear on the May 30 General Session agenda.

By-Laws & Rules Committee. Director Ed Nuti presented a change to the personnel policy manual that makes any misuse of SLLA sick leave policy grounds for immediate dismissal. With that change, he said, the manual is ready for approval by the Board at the May 30 General Meeting.

Security. Security Director Florence reminded residents that no vehicle parking is allowed on Association property after 11:00 pm. He said enforcement activities will be stepped up as the summer season begins and that violators' vehicles are subject to being towed.

Director Laura Douglass said she had heard of several near misses in which walkers or cyclists were almost struck by automobiles on Seven Lakes roadways. She asked that Florence prepare an article for The Times that explained the rules governing pedestrians and bicy-

Recreation. Douglass reported that the May Follies had raised \$3,500 and attracted 25 local businesses as sponsors. Several dozen volunteers helped make the day a success.

The Seven Lakes Stables are finding their feed budget inadequate for two reasons, Douglass said: the price of corn has risen markedly and the Association's horses are older and need special, more expensive feed. Douglass said she will be investigating options but noted that the feed budget may have to be increased.

There is \$32,000 in the SLLA capital budget for replacement of

County project will link 7 Lakes water tanks

Seven Lakes Drive between the Business Village and the North and South gates has been invaded by long blue pipes — materiel for a \$422,000 Moore County Public Utilities project that will provide a direct connection between the two Seven Lakes Water tanks.

The goal is to increase the performance of and increase redundancy within the water system, but it will not, unfortunately, add to the supply of water in Seven Lakes, County Engineer Lex Kelly told *The Times*.

Currently, the water tanks in Seven Lakes West and Seven Lakes North — both of which hold 150,000 gallons — are fed from separate connections to the county water system. The water level in the tanks rises and falls at different rates. The new interconnection will even that out and may cause some improvement in flow pressure in the system.

The project will also add another connection, running under Seven Lakes Drive, between Seven Lakes North and South. Currently all of Seven Lakes North is fed by a single water main that begins at the golf ball water tank. A secondary connection with the South Side will ensure water continues to flow if something goes wrong with the existing line.

Kelly could not provide a firm schedule for the completion of the project. He noted that the County is still working on obtaining an easement from the Aberdeen, Carolina, and Western Railroad to allow the water pipe to pass under their tracks.





County tax rate may fall, but tax bill will not

County taxpayers will be looking at a lower tax rate, but, in many cases, higher taxes, if Commissioners approve the Fiscal Year 2007-2008 budget proposed by Interim County Man-

ager Cary McSwain during the Board of Commissioners meeting Monday night, May 21.

Commissioners also approved a bond referendum, set for November, that will ask voters to approve \$69 million in borrowing for construction projects for Moore County Public Schools and Sandhills Community College

McSwain presented a proposed county budget totaling just over \$71 million for fiscal year 2007-2008, representing a five percent, \$3.4 million increase

over the current year's General Fund budget.

While the budget will increase, the overall county tax rate is expected to actually drop by three cents overall, from the current 49.5 cents per hundred dollars of property valuation to a requested 46.5 cents.

The decrease shaves two cents off the 45.5 cent levy that flows to the General Fund and a penny off the four cents allocated to support Emergency Medical Services. (Property owners pay a third levy, for fire protection services, which varies depending on the fire district in

which they live.)

This decline in the rate is possible because the county just undertook a revaluation of real property that has increased the tax base.

McSwain's presentation said he had attempted to assemble a revenue-neutral budget — one that would have lowered the tax rate proportionate to the increase in the tax base. That revenue-neutral General Fund tax rate would have been 38.5 cents per hundred, versus the current 45.5 cents and the proposed 43.5 cents.

duction of the Seven Lakes West

logo, designed by Betsy Mikula, that was painted on the tank freehand by artist Dennis Parker.

Residents may have noticed a large shroud that covered the tank while the sandblasting was underway. The cover was necessary because the old exterior paint was lead-based. Utility Operation Manager Ben Vaughn told *The Times* that the cost of the tank painting was covered as part of the County's on-going tank maintenance program.

A third county water project — a new interconnection between

the Pinehurst and Seven Lakes systems that has been installed along NC Highway 211 — is a few weeks from completion, County Engineer Kelly told *The Times*.

Leak testing and repair is nearly complete, and, as the leaks are sealed, portions of the line are being filled with superchlorinated water to sanitize them. Once that solution is flushed from the lines they are filled with drinking water and samples of that water are sent to Raleigh for state approval. Once the approvals are in place, the new connection can be brought into service.

Though both Kelly and Vaughn suggested the new pipe will increase the supply of water to Seven Lakes, neither would hazard a guess as to the size of that increase. Ultimately, the County will install a new booster station in the system, which is expected to increase the Seven Lakes water supply from 825,000 gallons per day to as much as 1.2 million gallons per day.

That project, however, sill not be completed until next year, which means water conservation — and avoiding excess irrigation — is likely to be important in Seven Lakes this summer.

Schools ask for \$53.5 million bond issue

The Moore County Board of Education unanimously resolved, during their regular meeting on May 14, to petition the County Commissioners to approve a \$53,537,177 million school bond referendum, to be called concurrently with elections in November. [The Commissioners approved the School Board's request during their May 21 meeting; see story on page 6.]

Citing current and anticipated facility needs and capital construction costs which exceed \$158 million, Superintendent Dr. Susan Purser said that it was "fiscally prudent at this time to request that citizens approve a bond referendum to fund a portion of the schools facility needs."

Dr. Purser noted that full details would be presented to the public in August and that an additional bond referendum would need to be considered again in several years.

Also approved during the meeting was \$9 million in increased costs associated with the Facilities Master Plan that were identified during the recent budget proposal process and an additional \$6 million in estimated costs for the revised athletic facility standards.

These revised standards require each county high school to construct or upgrade their athletic facilities to include a field house, a practice field, public restrooms, fencing, sports field lighting, a storage facility, and a water source.

School Board Chair Bruce Cunningham, Jr. said this measure "will ensure fairness across the county and across the schools. It will help us get a handle on treating everyone in an equitable manner."

Public Education Foundation

The Pubic Education Foundation is a nonprofit organization whose sole purpose is to raise money which is then awarded to Moore County teachers for special classroom projects or needs. While no specific grant guidelines are established, the foundation recognizes three broad categories: very special needs, very creative awards, and potentially valuable test sites.

Since its inception six years ago, the Public Education Foundation has awarded over \$145,000 in funds. This year, fifteen teachers received grants totaling \$20,828; with individual awards ranging from \$294 to \$6,000 dollars.

'Tuesday Tutors' help Hispanic kids keep up

The Moore County School Board recently honored West End Presbyterian Church as its Volunteer of the Month, in recognition of their Tuesday Tutoring program.

Each week, twenty Kindergarten through Seventh-grade students from local, Spanish-speaking homes meet for one-on-one tutoring and mentoring with volunteers at the church. Arriving immediately after school either in the church van or by school bus, the children are first provided a snack and then get to work. The sessions last one and half hours, after which the children are escorted home.

The Tuesday Tutoring program is now in its third year of service to the Moore County Hispanic community. Initiated through the efforts of Anna Stevens and former Westside resident Norma Walter, the program is now coordinated by Judy Kuhlberg of Seven Lakes West and Northsider Noreen Sawyer.

Assisting with both homework assignments and special projects or areas of need identified by their regular school teachers, volunteer tutors are able to provide the type of substantial educational assistance often not available in a home where English is not the primary language.

"Our volunteers form relationships and really care about their student," says Sawyer, "because each volunteer will

ing committee included a lot of Women of Seven Lakes members' husbands – and they did most of the work!"



Geologist Doe built a career on solid rock

Bruce Doe of Seven Lakes West was well prepared for his thirty-four years of service with the US Geological Survey [USGS], as well as his time spent on projects for NASA and the National Park Service.

A native of Saint Paul, Minnesota, Bruce earned a B.S. and a Bachelor of Geological Engineering degree from the University of Minnesota, an M.S. degree from the Missouri School of Mines, and a Ph.D. from the California Institute of Technology. He also completed a Postdoctoral Fellowship at the Geophysical Laboratory of the Carnegie Institute of Washington.

His experiences included both research and administrative positions. He has to his credit one hundred sixty published papers and abstracts. These included his major studies of the volcanic rocks of Yellowstone National Park and the San Juan Mountains, nicknamed the American Alps, of Colorado. His administrative tours with the USGS included Chief of the Branch of Isotope Geology, Assistant Chief Geologist of the Eastern Region, and Assistant Director of Research, among others.

He was the president of the


Geochemistry Society in 1982, a recipient of the Vernadsky Memorial Lectureship at the Vernadsky Institute in Moscow of the Soviet Union in 1976, during détente, and received an honorary Doctor of Science from the University of Missouri in

In the latter part of his career he was drawn into environmental concerns, and gave papers on "The Past is the Key to the Future," a presidential address for the Geochemical Society, "The Challenge of Global Housekeeping," a graduation address at the University of Missouri, and "What if Temperature's Don't Rise?," a keynote speech at the International Conference on European Technology and Trade in Sunderland, United Kingdom.

In 1965, Bruce went to Japan for the USGS to study volcanic lavas with emphasis on their "chemical fingerprints," as part of the US-Japan Scientific Cooperation Program. Later, Bruce was loaned out to NASA to help set up a lunar sample program as a means of determining the makeup of the moon and helped assign lunar samples for scientists to perform studies.

For his doctoral thesis, he went down into a zinc mine in upper New York State to study how an ore deposit formed. There was stored-up stress in the marble. Occasionally, a piece of marble would shoot off in various directions with a loud bang, fortunately missing Bruce and his colleagues but making them nervous.

Another research project was

a bit scary, too. That involved measuring damage to building stone due to acid rain and other pollution. In this study, he once had to climb about thirty feet up a swaying, free-standing scaffolding to examine a ceiling while a hurricane warning was expected at any time. The damage was severe enough that, eventually, the Jefferson Monument in Washington, DC, had to be closed for repairs.

Bruce and his wife Marjorie moved here from Springfield,

Virginia, in 2005. Like lots of the rest of Seven Lakers in retirement, he likes to keep both mind and legs exercised. Hence, his activity as a tennis and bridge player, and forays into writing poetry and prose.

His favorite couplet of all-time is from his poem, "How About an Asteroid:" "Who can possibly be annoyed/ About the study of an asteroid.

The poetry, he notes, has had "the curious history of being (See "Doe," p. 17)

Computer Club gets picture on digital photos

Brady Smith, president of the Sandhills Photography Club, was the featured speaker at the May 8 meeting of the Computer Club of Seven Lakes.

Smith described himself as a husband, father of three, an independent financial advisor, president of the photography club, and as having worked with computers for twenty-five years. His topic was Electronically Sharing of Photos and the presentation included the use of Adobe Photoshop Elements and included instruction on how to send pictures via e-mail, CD, DVD, and especially via the internet.

He described how using the Adobe Photoshop Elements program can help you make your photos look their best, show photos in creative and entertaining ways, easily find and view your photos and video clips, instantly fix common flaws.

Adobe can also give you greater control over color and lighting, allow user to perform advanced editing, to create composites and artistically enhance photos, get started quickly with flexible layout options, and share with family and friends using built-in photo services on the web.

An important part of Smith's presentation included the uploading of photos to the internet for

storing, sharing, and printing. He demonstrated this using the website www.shutterfly.com. Friends and relatives may view photos and order directly. There are many other websites that offer similar service including snapfish.com, kodak.com, photos.walmart.com/home/.

Of interest to many in the audience was an explanation of why photos are distorted with the infamous red eve effect. You may have noticed that red eye only appears in pictures taken using a flash. The reason for this is simple — the flash causes red eye. The red-eye in your images is caused by light reflecting off the retina, which is a fine network of nerves in the back of the eye, an area rich in blood. Although the retina is not normally visible, if the flash is on the same plane as the lens, the light bounces directly back into the lens and the retina becomes visible in the photo, causing redeye. This has become more common with smaller compact digital cameras where the flash is very close to the lens. Professional photographer's flash is mounted high on the camera or sometimes a pro will even take it off the camera to avoid this problem.

Smith invites photography devotees to visit www.sandhillsphotoclub.org, the home page of the Sandhills Photography Club. Meetings are held on the second Monday of each month at 7:00 pm, at Christ Fellowship Church on Midland Road at Pee Dee Road in Southern Pines.

Jules Skalski provided the newly introduced Five Minute Tip which is presented at the beginning of each meeting. Skalski introduced the fact that in Outlook Express 6.0, the Microsoft E-Mail software, most incoming e-mails with attachments are automatically stopped from getting to the user because it is assumed that the attach-

ments may contain a virus. In many cases, the user would like to disable this feature. Skalski demonstrated how this can be done temporarily without affecting the computer operation.

Skalski also demonstrated a second tip using Outlook Express: how to disable the "Preview Pane" temporarily in order to decrease a computer's vulnerability to virus attacks. Both these tips will be thoroughly

explained in the Computer Club's June newsletter.


al Cancer Survivors Day will begin with greetings from President George W. Bush as well as from the director of the National Cancer Institute.

GARDENING Seven Lakes Times May 25, 2007

Different plants have different water needs

The weather trends in 2007 have been rather variable which is very important to gardening. Again this year temperatures and soil moisture levels have generally been below normal. Some meteorologists are predicting another dry growing season for gardening.

A few years ago tips were given on the effectiveness of watering. It is necessary to repeat a portion of it. The need for watering varies among plants, because of type, size, location, soil type, physiology, and stages of growth. To briefly explain, cacti require less water for growth and development than ferns. A tree is able to obtain its moisture more readily than a tomato plant soil moisture, rainfall, or supplementary waterings for plant survival. An additional one half to one inch supplementary water is needed for optimum plant growth and development.





killers and your local garden center dealer perhaps will have an adequate supply of weed controls. Here are a few trade names, Lawn Weed Control with Trimac, Southern Speed Zone, Trimac Southern, Weed and Feed, Weed Out, Weed-B-Gon, and other phenoxys will keep after and control the grasses and weeds in your lawn. Follow all labeled directions carefully and select the best product for vour needs.

If you have neglected fertilizing your Bermuda or Zoysia lawn, as I have, do it now. If your Centipede lawn needs a boost, a light application of special Centipede plant food will do the job.

Pinch back chrysanthemums when they reach four to five inches tall, and prune them once a month until July 15. The result will be shaped and symmetrical formed plants that will produce beautiful flowers next Fall.







Some of the most important rules are:

1. All powerboats are required to travel in a counter-clockwise direction;

- 2. No more than six power and/or pontoon boats pulling water skiers, kneeboards, or other floatation devices at any one time on Lake Seguoia and a maximum of two on Lake Echo:
- 3. Ski boats on Lake Sequoia must stay within the designated ski buoy area;

4. Skiers must stay at least seventy-five feet from shorelines or any other stationary or floating objects.

Please review all of our Rules and Regulations to insure your safety and those of other residents using our lakes.





Looking for a fish? Try finding its nest!

A few days ago my friend Lib Monroe asked whether it was time to go fishing. Thirsting for the opportunity to expound on the subject, I began my response.

"Lib, we must wait until the water warms to sixty to sixty-five degrees, perhaps to mid April. Then we can...."

Very politely she interrupted stating that she was already late for her bowling league tournament and must be excused.

Though hardened via similar past rebuffs, I shall continue addressing the issue with you patient and captive readers' permission.

It is now time to throw the quilts aside, pry oneself out of the rocking chair and begin to make your fishing equipment and yourself ready for the coming season. For Spring is here and the grass is rizz. Plan to scout around the water's edge and locate likely spawning areas.





Companion Animal Clinic will charge \$35.00 for male cats and \$45.00 for all others. "Based on research, we need to do twenty-five spay/neuters a day, five days a week to insure that CAC is cost effective.

Animal welfare groups and animal control centers in the nine counties have an on-going need for low-cost spay/neuter," said Deborah Wilson, President of CAC.

"Because animal welfare groups and public shelters are overwhelmed with animals, we anticipate that we will be at capacity quickly. CAC will enable animal shelters to concentrate on adoption by providing low-cost spay/neuter."

"Eventually we will be able to

significantly reduce the numbers of animals coming into shelters by these proactive measures," said Wilson.

CAC will serve a nine-county region including Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke, Chatham, Richmond, Randolph, Moore, Montgomery, and Lee. CAC will have a vehicle to provide pick-up and delivery of animals for groups.

Renovations to the CAC building are now underway to convert it into a state-of-the-art spay/neuter clinic. Companion Animal Clinic will only offer spay/neuter services. It is not a shelter and it is not a boarding facility.

CAC will have its own staff of veterinarians and veterinary technicians and is currently in the process of hiring for these positions.

Sunglasses are essential to eye health

include the development of pterygium (white or creamy opaque growth attached to the cornea), and squamous cell cancer of the conjunctiva.

Some 16 million people world-wide are currently blind as a result of cataracts. Of these, WHO (World Health Organization) estimates that as many as 20 percent may be due to UV radiation exposure.

Given the facts, are we protecting our eyes enough?

My conclusion is no.

Various doses of the nicotine patch are available. Generally, the maximum dose which is around 21mg/day is recommended for smokers who smoke fifteen or more cigarettes per day. This dose is usually tapered down at two or three week intervals or as tolerated by the patient.

Concerning nicotine gum, generally 2mg should be considered the optimal dose for patients unless they smoke greater than twenty cigarettes per day or have previously failed therapy on the 2mg. If either of these cases exists, then the 4mg gum is recommended. The 2mg users should not use more than thirty pieces of gum per day, and 4mg users should use no more

than twenty pieces of gum per day.

In conclusion, the risks involved with smoking are ever present and the desire to quit smoking is right in front of our faces. We wish you the best as you prepare to make this health-smart decision and start your New Year

off smoke-free, and remain that way!

LOAN CAP PROTECTION

If you plan to finance a home with an adjustable rate mortgage (one that goes up and down with the interest rate at periodic intervals) make sure you focus on the presence or absence of interest-rate "caps."

Caps are "security blanket" ceilings. They represent a guarantee from the lender that you will not be required to pay more than an agreed-upon maximum rate no matter how high interest rates may skyrocket.

The two most common rate caps are life-of-the-loan and annual. Life-of-the-loan caps shield you against total rate increases beyond, say four to five percentage points through the entire term of the loan. Annual caps are usually in the 1 to 2 percent range, offering protection against sudden, sharp runups. Remember that these consumer features are optional and valuable. If you are offered an adjustable loan rate without a cap, you should be getting a price break to compensate you for the additional risk.

But achieving that goal was impossible "without laying waste to departments or programs already too lean," McSwain told Commissioners.

Among the key goals of the 2007-2008 budget, according to McSwain's presentation, was to stop the practice of appropriating money from the undesignated fund balance — the county's reserves - to fund the current year operating budget. That appropriation could have totaled more than \$8 million in the current fiscal year, according to McSwain, though a combination of higher than projected revenues and expense control prevented any actual appropriation of the fund balance.

Eschewing the use of the fund balance in the coming year means taxpayers will have to make up the difference — to the tune of \$10.6 million. [Check the end of this article for an explanation.]

Here are some highlights of McSwain's budget presentation:

- County departments requested a total of 33 new staff positions; McSwain's budget asks for 13 (Five of these positions are in public works, information technology, and property management, areas funded outside the General Fund.)
- The county is expected to have a \$3.8 million Medicaid bill in the coming year, but

McSwain's budget counts on a proposal in the North Carolina General Assembly that would cap county Medicaid contributions at their 2006 level — \$3.3 million — though it's not certain what the General Assembly will actually do to provide Medicaid relief to the counties.

 McSwain's budget proposes an 11.9 percent increase in operating funds for Moore County Schools, but gives the school system about \$900,000 less than the school board requested.

School bonds

Commissioners approved requests from both Moore County Schools [MCS] and Sandhills Community College [SCC] to have voters consider bond referendums on election day in November to fund major school construction projects.

The \$53.5 million MCS request includes the construction of a

new elementary school in the southern portion of the county, which includes Seven Lakes, Foxfire, Pinehurst, Southern Pines, and Aberdeen; a new middle school in the central portion of the county; renovations at seven other schools, and improvements at several MCS athletic facilities.

This is only the first phase of MCS's three phase Facilities Master Plan, which extends through 2018 and is likely to cost well in excess of \$150 million

The \$15.5 million SCC request includes a new 35,000 square foot classroom to replace Blue Hall; an EMS training facility that will include both residential and commercial burn buildings; a second entrance to the SCC campus, a 10,000 square foot maintenance and warehouse facility; a conservatory for the landscape gardening program; and \$2.9 million in repairs and renovations.

The commissioners' approval of the referendum request means that voters will have a chance to decide in November whether the county should borrow the money to pay for the projects. No estimates of the impact of the bond issues on property taxes were presented during the meeting.

Other Business

During Monday night's meeting the Board of Commissioners also:

- Approved a rezoning request for Accelerated Technologies Laboratories, Inc. of Seven Lakes that will allow the company to continue to expand its software business located on Holly Grove School Road.
- Approved several budget amendments, including one that forgives a \$240,000 debt owed the county by the Moore

County Airport. Commissioners Tim Lea and Cindy Morgan voted against that amendment.

- Proclaimed May as Foster Parent Appreciation Month in Moore County.
- Approved the minutes form the May 7 regular meeting and approved nearly \$58,000 in tax releases.
- Approved resolutions that allow the county to continue to participate in statewide Worker's Compensation and Property Insurance pools.
- Asked for an extension of the completion date for water projects funded by a \$400,000 US Department of Agriculture Rural Center Grant.
- Approved some changes to the county's Sewer Use Ordinance that were mandated by the North Carolina Divi-

- Haggard said he received a response to a inquiry about home mail delivery in Seven Lakes West from Senator Elizabeth Dole's (R-NC) office. Dole had forwarded the community's request to the US Postal Service and will notify the SLWLA when she receives a response.
- · A new fee schedule for the use of West Side Park, included in the annual dues mailing, had created the perception that Seven Lakes clubs would now be charged for use of the Community Center. "That is simply not the case," Haggard said, explaining that a revised fee schedule had been drafted and is being thoroughly reviewed before being published again. "Hopefully that will put to rest the issue of fees and deposits," he added.
- Haggard siad he had signed a Letter of Understanding with the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA], identical to that signed last year, that provides for reciprocal use of amenities and participation in recreational programs.
- · Haggard said the Board intends to use the SLWLA website as a primary medium for communicating important and timely information to Westside residents. He encouraged landowners to make a habit of

visiting the website — at www.sevenlakeswest.org — on a daily basis.

Manager's report

Community Manager Tony Robertson, as well as several board members, praised the work of Ronnie and Betty Milligan to beautify the traffic island at the entrance to Seven Lakes West. Robertson christened in "Milligan's Island.'

Robertson noted that the West Side Park pool opens this Saturday, May 26, and said the pool schedule is posted on the website and in the SLWLA Landowners Office.

Robertson said he is working with the North Carolina Department of Transportation [NCDOT] to secure a protected left turn into Seven Lakes West for traffic traveling Westbound on NC Highway 211. "It looks good," Robertson said, "but only time will tell."

Finance

Treasurer Kathy Kirst said the Association has retained Busby and Company of Southern Pines to perform an audit of association finances. In response to a question, she said the by-laws currently leave the frequency of audits at the discretion of the Treasurer, adding that she feels





an every-other-year audit, with a review in the alternate years, is appropriate for the Association.

Kirst provided printed summaries of SLWLA's fund balances and income statements. She noted that the Association was forced to take \$81,000 out of reserves to cover several costs not anticipated in the 2006-2007 budget, including legal fees associated with the Wildlife Resources Commission dispute, higher costs related to the increased cost of petroleum, and the addition of a staff position that was not reflected in the budaet.

Kirst said here finance and audit committee will be conducting quarterly budget reviews and adjustments in order to stay on top of changes in the financial picture as the year progresses.

Recreation

Recreation Director Jo Nicholas said her committee had met on May 7 and laid out an event schedule through the end of the year.

A Summer Kick-off party will be help at West Side Park on Saturday, June 9 from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm; Nicholas encouraged residents to bring blankets of lawn chairs for an afternoon of fun.

Other events on the schedule include July 4 fireworks, an end-of-summer tailgate party in August, Margaritaville night in September, Oktoberfest in October, Trunk or Treat on Halloween, and the annual tree lighting and a Children's Christmas party in December.

Environment

Drivers appear to be heading calls for obeying the speed limit over the Lake Auman dam, Environment Director Mary Anne Fewkes reported. She announced that speed bumps will be installed on either end of the dam roadway on Tuesday, May 29, to help control speed over the dam.

Fewkes said the Moore County Sheriff's Office is unable to provide an off-duty officer to patrol

Lake Auman, because the lake is private. The Board is exploring the possibility of hiring a compliance officer for the lake, but, with the boating season underway, Fewkes will be reactivating the Lake Patrol. She encouraged residents to watch the website and bulletin boards for upcoming organizational meetings for the patrol.

Fewkes reminded landowners that boats may pull ski tubes only in the ski area; the tubes should not be pulled behind the boat from Johnson Point or private docks, but left in the boat until it reaches the ski area.

A recent survey of Lake Auman coves by Fewkes and Haggard found only one in definite need of herbicide treatment to control aquatic weeds that are impeding boat travel. Adjacent landowners will be notified before any treatment is done. Landowners are not permitted to treat their own coves with herbicide but should contact Fewkes if they find that weed growth is making it difficult to reach their property by boat.

Fewkes said she had received several complaints about Canada Geese but had discovered that there is nothing the SLWLA can do about them at present. She urged residents to neither feed them or shoot them, and noted that both pink flamingos and reflective tape can be effective in keeping them off lawns.

Fewkes thanked Betty Millgan for new plantings at Johnson point, and Jo Kinney for donating the pots. She recognized Bruce and Sandy Keyser for their work as dock masters and Patti Cleary for serving as event coordinator for the Point. She thanked the Lake Aumn Sports Club for their recent cleanup around the lake.



with the Club as stated by Mr.
Weber in *The Times*."

"The Club has tried to state that they are willing to work out this situation, but their mind was made up long ago."

Perhaps the most significant paragraph in Florence's statement raises for the first time in a public forum a key concern of the Landowners Association: the prospect that the Club could be sold to an outside group. Florence noted that membership in the Club is in decline, threatening the Club's finances. "The Club's financial situation scares us," Florence wrote.

Ensuring that the SLLA has some control over the use of the golf course property after any sale is a key concern, Florence said, and is among the chief reasons the SLLA Board has insisted that Southside covenants apply to Club property.

"If the Club is sold to a private developer, and this issue of the covenants is not settled, then anything goes with that land, anything can be done to it and the SLLA will not be able to do anything about it," Florence wrote.

"What the SLLA Board is doing is protecting every homeowner's investment in this community," he continued. "Legal fights may be coming, but the Board has an obligation to its homeowners."

Florence says the Club must agree that the covenants apply to SLCC property — something that Weber's letter said the Club could not and would not do — and submit plans for the new driving range to the SLLA's Architectural Review Board.

Comparing Florence's letter to Weber's suggests there is little room for compromise on the matter, but the two parties had scheduled a meeting for this week.

SLLA President Don Truesdell said he and Director Ed Nuti, along with Association attorney Hunter Stovall, would meet with SLCC General Manager Mike Spayd, Board member Denny Galford, and Club attorney Penny Hayes on Thursday, May 24 at 2:00 pm [after this edition of *The Times* went to press].

"Keep your fingers crossed," Truesdell told those who attended the May 16 work session.

Here is the complete text of Florence's statement:

From Michael Florence, SLLA Board Member

In the May 11, 2007 issue of The Seven Lakes Times there was a front page article written by Dick Weber, President of the Seven Lakes Country Club. In the article he details how the club has tried to deal with the SLLA on the issue of moving and building a new driving range. Since last year this issue is one the Landowner's Board has been dealing with and spending in my opinion too much time talking about. It was clear to me last year, as it is clear to me now that the Club is going to try and do whatever the Club wants to. The Club has tried to get the Landowner's Board to try and rubberstamp and approve this issue before it even allows its members to even vote on the sale of the old driving range.

Let me state that since last year the SLLA has been unanimous in its approval of having the Club build the new driving range. All we have asked is that the Club present its plans to the Architectural Review Board, have the ARB sign off on it, and move on. The Club, only after intense negotiations, said they would present the plan under protest. This has not happened.

The Club has stated that they are not under any form of restrictive covenants, and they can do whatever they want. In one meeting they used the example of

the daily placements of their fairway pins to argue against the covenants. They said they would have to submit the locations of these pins for Landowner approval. Not so.

Yes, the previous Board did start negotiations with the Club concerning this issue. One of these discussions dealt with the submission of the range plans to the ARB, another was that the club fell under the Southside restated restrictive covenants. We never had a official compromise worked out with the Club as stated by Mr. Weber in *The Times*.

The Club has tried to state that they are willing to work out this situation, but their mind was made up long ago. The SLLA has sought out legal opinions on if the Club falls under the Southside Restated Restricted Covenants Their opinions are they do.

The Club's financial situation scares us. Membership is down, and the Club has obligations it may find hard pressed to meet. If the Club is sold to a private developer, and this issue of the covenants is not settled, then anything goes with that land, anything can be done to it and the SLLA will not be able to do anything about it.

What the SLLA Board is doing is protecting every homeowners investment in this community. Legal fights may be coming, but the Board has an obligation to its



to haul away debris, as well as the lack of progress in getting a new maintenance shed assembled

Nuti said he is investigating alternatives to the current arrangement for debris disposal, including the possibility of handling the job in-house.

New road repair estimates that utilize a different repaving technique are coming in at \$55,000 per mile rather than \$75,000 per mile. Nuti said his committee will be working up a schedule for repaving priority areas.

President Truesdell again raised the possibility of having an engineering firm conduct a review of Seven Lakes roads in order to assist in planning for repairs. Board members had been given an opportunity to review an example of the firm's work — a study done for Foxfire Village. Polling Board members, Truesdell got mixed reviews on whether the \$7,000 cost of the study would be money well spent.

Nuti suggested having Frank Horan, a member of his maintenance committee with some expertise in road maintenance, take a look at the proposed study and provide input on its value. The Board is expected to hear from Horan at the May 30 General Meeting.

Finance. Treasurer Steve Hud-

son said Fiscal year 2006-2007 ended with \$1,279,000 in revenue, \$954,000 in operating expenses, and \$436,000 in capital expenses. State-mandated repairs to Echo Dam were responsible for the unusually high level of capital expenditures, Hudson said.

The year ended with a \$111,000 decrease in cash reserves. Of the \$303,000 in reserves remaining, \$125,000 are restricted reserves for road paving.

Hudson said thirteen problem accounts owning \$43,000 in back dues have been turned over the the Association attorney to have liens placed against the properties involved.

President's report. SLLA President Don Truesdell said the Association's employee group has been accepted by Blue Cross Blue Shield of North Carolina for health insurance purposes and negotiations with a second company are also in process. "I am confident that we will have a better policy for our employees and maybe even a reduction in cost," Truesdell said.




