## Foxfire Council passes on volunteer police force

Concerns over liability risk led the Foxfire Village Council to reject an ordinance to establish an auxiliary police force in a 3-2 vote held during the regular meeting of the council on Tuesday, October 9.

Councilman Carl Munro presented the proposal as part of his Public Safety report in response to a request from a former police officer who expressed interest in performing police duties for the village as an unpaid employee.

Tony Evans, who has twenty years experience as a law enforcement officer, approached the village and asked to serve as an auxiliary police officer. Evans, who is now employed in an unrelated field, would be able to maintain his police certification through this work.

Describing the duties of an auxiliary police officer as being limited to special events or occasions when the regular police department could use extra assistance, Munro explained that Evans would work under

## Lakers honoring water restrictions

"The numbers are great!" Moore County Public Works Director Dennis Brobst told *The Times* on Wednesday, reporting on the response of water customers to the implementation of Stage 3 Mandatory Water Conservation on October 1.

The water restrictions call for users to reduce their consumption by 50 percent and eliminate all use of water for irrigation.

Since the restrictions were announced on October 2, Seven Lakes water customers have met or beat the 412,500 gallon per day target usage on every day but one. Pinehurst customers have met their 1.6 million gallon per day goal on each of the last five days.

"The calls [to Public Utilities] have run the gamut," Brobst said, noting that he talked with one 1,500 gallon per month customer who "was so upset" that she couldn't meet the 50 percent reduction. "We have others who call in and say. 'I just put in \$15,000 worth of landscaping and I'm going to water it."

## **Board delays**LTL trail decision

The Westside Board will wait until December to make a decision on the Loop the Lake [LTL] proposal for a pedestrian trail along Longleaf Drive.

Meeting in a Work Session on Tuesday, September 9, the Directors of the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association decided to wait until after their Fiscal Year 2008-2009 budget had been nailed down before taking action on the LTL project.

President Jim Haggard proposed allowing the LTL Committee — a subcommittee of the Association's Long-Range Planning Committee — to construct a one-mile segment of the trail running from the intersection of Smathers Drive and Longleaf Drive to West Side Park - connecting the community's two primary recreation areas. "The idea would be to give them authority to do a one-mile stretch with no association money," Haggard said, giving the LTL committee the opportunity to see whether they could in fact raise money to support the con-





### SLLA work session covers a lot of ground

The Seven Lakes Landowners Association is in desperate need of a five year plan, Northside resident Charlie Oliver told Association Directors at the beginning of their Wednesday night, October 10 Work Session. Oliver had arranged in advance to be placed on the meeting agenda.

Noting that he had served on three separate committees of the Board, Oliver said, "that has convinced me that we need a five-year plan, starting with you folks doing some work immediately." The plan should have sections for each Board member and their respective areas of responsibility, he noted.

"Without a plan we have spent money in a knee-jerk fashion," Oliver said, something that can't continue.

Noting that the Board had recently purchased a barcode gate system, security cameras, a maintenance building, and a pool fence. "They may be needed by the community, but they have never been planned," Oliver said. "We don't have that kind of money. It's time to get a plan."

The result will be "a more harmonious board and more harmonious community rather than the acrimony that we have had in the community for the past several years," Oliver concluded.

#### **Community standards**

Community Standards Director Randy Zielsdorf suggested a change in the process of dealing with rules infraction. Currently the SLLA staff begins the process with a verbal warning, followed by a certified letter if there is no response. If the infraction is not resolved, a second certified letter is sent notifying the violator that the case will be referred to the judicial committee.

Zielsdorf proposed a simplified process in which the initial response to a reported infraction would be a letter to the landowner giving them ten days to correct the infraction. If not remedied in the allotted time, the matter will be referred to the Judicial Committee.

President Don Truesdell suggested reducing the allotted time — the "cure period" — to seven days from the date the letter is mailed. Other Board members expressed support for the rules change. Ed Nuti's rules committee will add it to the revised rules and regulations, which are expected to be voted on in the October General Session, scheduled for October 26.

#### Irrigating from the lakes

Board members discussed whether drawing irrigation water from the community lakes should be prohibited during the current drought, revisiting a topic they had discussed in the September General Meeting.

Noting that Moore County Public Utilities had moved to Stage 3 Mandatory Water Conservation, which prohibits any use of the public water supply for irrigation, President Don Truesdell asked Board members whether watering from the lakes should also be eliminated.

A lengthy discussion followed, involving not only Board members but members of the Lakes and Dams Committee and various other landowners.

Northsider Mark Widman asked Board members to consider calculations of the impact of watering on lake levels that had been prepared by Lakes and Dams Committee member George Temple and forwarded to Board members. Temple's data showed that even frequent irrigation by lakefront lots owners would be unlikely to lower the water levels in even the smallest lakes by more than one-halfinch per month. The impact of irrigation from the larger lakes like Lake Sequoia, would amount to little more than one-tenth of an inch per month. By contrast, the lakes lose four inches per month

to evaporation during the warmer

summer months.

In response to a question from Director Laura Douglass, Temple said "I can't imagine on any lake that it [the effect of irrigation] is five percent of the evaporation rate. The lakes are going to go down if it doesn't rain. The irrigation is virtually insignificant. That it the reason the [Lakes and Dams] Committee voted against restrictions on watering from the lakes.

Though Douglass said she had little sympathy for lakefront property owners who had overseeded their lawns during a drought, there was little appetite for mandatory restrictions among

firefighters from West End, Eagle Springs, and many other local area districts are called in to assist.


Last year, the department answered 292 calls with 100 of those calls in Seven Lakes.





### The ancient what and why of Tai Chi

When recently asked about the form of exercise called Tai Chi, Master Lee Holbrook, Tai Chi Instructor at Seven Lakes Massage & Body Therapies, replied, "Many people have heard Tai Chi is a relaxing, gentle exercise which is a form of stress relief and helps in improving health. ### Purser 'chats' about school bond referendum

Describing the upcoming school bond referendum as, "The most important thing now and for the future of Moore County," Vice Chair Dr. Lorna Clack, and other members of the Board of Education, thanked Superintendent Dr. Susan Purser during the Moore County Schools [MCS] Business Meeting held on Monday, October 8.

Dr. Purser has been traveling the county hosting evening chats, including a visit to West End

Elementary on Thursday, October 4, and speaking to various civic groups to present information regarding facilities needs that are included in the \$54 million school bond referendum.

"These chats are an ideal opportunity for me to meet people, answer questions, get input on various topics and hear others' thoughts about educational issues," she said.

Board Member W. Joe Vaughn

said, "Dr. Purser is very patient and good at explaining the bonds so well."

The school bond referendum, if passed, will fund Phase I of the School Facilities Master Plan which includes a new elementary school in Area III [Pinehurst-West End] of the county and a new middle school in Area I [Vass-Carthage], in addition to athletic facilities upgrades and improvements for all county middle and high schools.

In Area III, Pinehurst Elementary and West End Elementary are facing rapid growth. Pinehurst Elementary is thirtythree percent over capacity. The main structures were built between 1940's and 1990's and the school houses ten mobile units. West End Elementary is nearing one hundred students over capacity. The main structures were built between 1950's and

1980's and the school houses four mobile units.

The new elementary school proposed for Area III is estimated to cost \$12 million. The proposed middle school is estimated to cost \$17 million, and athletic facilities improvements to cost \$6 million. The remaining funds in the school bond will be used for multiple capital improvement projects throughout the county.

### **MCS Plans Energy** Saving

Committee

In anticipation of new school construction in Moore Countv. the Board of Education recommended an Energy Conservation Committee be formed. At the MCS Business Meeting on Monday, October 8, John Hawthorne, executive supervisor for construction, presented conservation guidelines developed by the committee for projects scheduled during implementation of Phase I of the Capital Improvement Plan-Facilities Master Plan.

Hawthorne said the two new schools will be prototype models and that site selection and building orientation will be extremely important to take advantage of solar energy by reducing heat gain in the summer months and heat loss in the winter months.

Prospective school sites are evaluated based upon size, shape, location, topography, drainage, accessibility, traffic, security, safety, soil conditions, plant life, noise levels, utilities, zoning, and


Goodwin also said that she is interested in starting training courses for working parents to assist them with homework concerns.

Energy management systems will be installed on all heating and air conditioning equipment, maximum insulation to reduce energy consumption, interior shades, sufficient building overhangs, insulating glass, and use of light colors and reflecting materials will be incorporated in construction specifications.

Landscape design will include minimal landscaping while maintaining existing vegetation when possible. Sites will be supplemented with pines or other deciduous trees that will, over time, provide shade during the warmer months. Grassed areas will be a hybrid Bermuda sod which is very hardy and needs little water once established.

Hawthorne said that while the county may not seek LEED certification, a point system developed by the U.S. Green Building Council, many of the six components identified on their checklist would be included in new school construction. LEED-certified projects are evaluated for sustainable sites, water efficiency, energy & atmosphere, materials and resources, indoor environmental quality, innovation in design process.

Board Member Kathy Farren remarked, "We have to be careful not to spend too much money on conservation and recycling. We need to be conservative when spending public money." She continued, "I am impressed with work you [Hawthorne] are doing here balancing between them."

Bruce Cunningham, Jr. Chair of Board of Education, agreed saying, "We must be responsible and save taxpayer money and also be environmentally responsible."







Board members. Donna Stephan said "It hurts my body" to see lakefront property owners watering while her plants are dying from lack of water.

"I have a problem trying to regulate what people are trying to do on the lakes," Treasurer Steve Hudson said. "Given the data on evaporation rates, I don't think it needs to be mandatory. I would think that people would try to be neighborly about it. I would think that people who live on the lake would use some control"

It was not clear at the end of the lengthy discussion exactly where the Board stood on the issue. Summing up his position, President Truesdell said, "We should start with voluntary restrictions as imposed by Moore County — which in Stage III means no outside watering at all. If there are violators, we should take it further. We are looking for voluntary compliance to the Moore County restrictions."

#### Pumping from lake to lake

Truesdell opened a discussion about pumping water from one community lake to another by establishing which lakes are connected to allow pumping. Water can be moved from Big Juniper or Longleaf to Little Juniper, from Sequoia to Dogwood, and from Echo to both Ramapo and Timber. In addition, water can be moved from Seven Lakes Country Club's [SLCC] Lake Windermere to Little Juniper.

Truesdell said the Lakes and Dams Committee had decided in its last meeting to ask the Club to allow three hours per day of pumping from Windermere to Little Juniper, in exchange for the three hours a day of pumping from Lake Echo that SLCC is allowed for maintenance of its tennis courts on the North

Lakes and Dams Committee member Ron Erskine argued against the plan, expressing concerns about the quality of the water in Windermere. Windermere's only purpose is golf course irrigation, Erskine said, so the club is not overly concerned about the quality of water in the lake. In contrast, residents fish and swim in Little Juniper. Erskine urged the Board to pump water from Longleaf instead.

Truesdell, referring to water quality reports from May of this year, said nitrate levels in Windermere, Longleaf, Little Juniper and Big Juniper were all reported to be less than half the "stream standard" level set be the state. Erskine argued in turn that nitrates were not the only pollutants of concern.

Truesdell said he would attempt to negotiate the pumping deal arrangement with Club President Dick Weber, but it appeared he would wait until new water quality studies are done later this month before actually turning on the pumps.

#### **Employee sick leave**

Treasurer Steve Hudson provided the Board with data on the Association's sick leave and Christmas bonus policies, generating a discussion on the advisability of changing either policy. Employees earn ten sick days per year and can carry over unused days from one year to the next until they accumulate a maximum of thirty days. Hudson said there was a wide variation among employees in the number of days used and accumulated.

Hudson asked for each Director's thoughts on the issue but elicited little interest in changing the existing policy. Randy Ziels-

dorf said he was currently working under the state system, which is more generous than the SLLA policies, and said he did not see the 30 day maximum accumulation as excessive.

Donna Stephan said "I have trouble taking anything away that we felt was worth giving to them [the employees] in the past. The only thing I can see is changing the cap [on accumulated sick days].

Hudson said he felt that 30 day cap was fine as is but objected to the use of sick days to care for an ailing parent, spouse, or child. "The companies I have

So don't think I wasn't thinking of them, because not a moment goes by that I an not thinking of them, and wishing that I was home to hold them and enjoy just being in their presence.

Wish One: I wish ignorance wasn't as contagious and stubborn as it is. Now I don't mean stupidity. Stupidity is very unorganized and nothing comes from it, but ignorance is cold and calculating, and always excepting new members. It is the root of every major conflict in history, and the very reason I am not at home right now.

Why is it so easy to make an entire population of people believe something so ludicrous and wrong, and not only believe it, but believe it for thousands of years and believe so strongly that they are willing to give up their own lives to follow it? Why does the urge to be a part of something more than ourselves

So we are gonna give this usually cause us to blindly join any cause that will accept us into it? It's not just the poor Third World countries, our own high and mighty country has equally ignorant groups in abundance.

> Our gangs and racist cults, secret societies, overzealous religious groups, even the people who righteously oppose this war with acts of violence and anger, why do they



### LTL trail is too disruptive, too expensive

I have just read the September 28 issue of The Times and have to take issue with a few of the comments made by the proponents of this project. I also find it interesting that most, if not all, of these individuals do not live on Longleaf Drive.

As I understand it, the path is projected to be six feet wide with a five foot wide planting strip. This equates to an eleven foot wide strip from the curb to the inside border of the path.

Have any of these individuals taken the time to measure eleven feet from the curb around Longleaf Drive to determine what may be in the way, and will have to be moved, or circumvented, such as; street signs, cable boxes, electric boxes, water mains, fences, and fire hydrants? I have just driven around Longleaf Drive and found fire hydrants that were six and eight feet from the curb, water meters, that were seven feet from the curb, and power boxes that were seven to ten feet from the curb.

These don't even take into consideration the numerous improvements that property owners have put in, such as lamp pole lights, lawns, plantings, etc, that are also an issue.

I'm sure everyone was informed when they moved here that the association had a rightof-way, but can you imagine what our properties would look like if the owners only began their landscaping seventeen feet or so back from the road and left the rest to nature? As you drive around Longleaf Drive, look at what some homeowners have done to enhance their property, thereby improving their value and the overall value of Seven Lakes West as a whole.

We have been informed that the cost of installing the path would be \$9 to \$19 per foot depending on the composition of the path. Let's use a mean of \$15 per foot. For the seven miles around Longleaf Drive, that equates to 36,960 linear feet, or \$554,400.

When Longleaf Drive was constructed it was cut out of a hilly topography, leaving steep banks. and in some cases, severe dropoffs, on a major portion of it. Therefore there would be an

additional expense for the prep work involved to make the proposed path horizontally level, regardless of which side of the road the proposed trail takes. In addition, there is the cost of relocating some of the obstacles previously mentioned. I have been involved in many projects and have yet to see one come in



on budget. My guess is that this proposed trail would cost in excess of \$750,000.

One proponent of the project indicated it would, "promote a cohesive sense of community and help bring people together." I beg to differ. Walking in adjacent neighborhoods would accomplish this much better. I ride my bike seven to ten miles up and down Longleaf and into surrounding neighborhoods every day, and, at most, come across six to eight people. Granted, there may be more out and about throughout the day but I don't see that that justifies an expense in excess of a half million dollars.

There are forty-one roads that access Longleaf Drive, from the right and left, from one end of the dam around to the other end. Most of the roads lead into a myriad of other roads and neighborhoods and are no more than a quarter of a mile from each other, making it very easy to utilize low traffic areas for the purpose of walking or rid-

I would also like to point out that a walking trail already exists. It is on the left-hand side of Fawnwood Drive and extends for a distance of .3 of a mile. I urge you to take a look at it. It is in deplorable condition. If that small distance cannot be maintained, how do we expect one can be maintained that would be about seven miles long?

The article also mentioned that the trail would vary from one side of the road to the other, depending on topography. This would necessitate crossing Longleaf Drive at various points to stay on the trail. This is definitely a safety issue. For those of you with children, would you want them going back and forth over a busy road?

I would like the board to consider two alternatives:

1. I have been told that the dam may never be used again for vehicular traffic. For a few thousand dollars, small parking areas could be established at each end of the dam. People could park their vehicles and take a nice one mile walk on "Lake Auman Boulevard." Add some benches on each side about one hundred yards apart so people could sit and

### A trail in the back yard is no picnic

Dear Editor:

I am writing in reference to the proposal of creating a continuous pedestrian/bike path around the perimeter of Longleaf Drive. I can speak knowledgeably on this subject because I own a house in Southern Pines with a public pedestrian/bike trail running across the back of my yard.

When I first purchased my home in 1993, I had a wonderful hammock hanging between the trees and would often read the paper back there and take turns swinging in the hammock with my two children. Since the path was established a few years ago, there has been such a steady stream of strangers going across my backyard that I have no desire to spend leisure time in my yard because of the extreme lack of privacy.

To make matters worse, most of the pedestrians also have a dog or two in tow and they walk their pets in my backyard with no thought of cleaning up the mess. I have had to get a current survey done to mark the bound-

aries of my yard and I am in the process of planting heavily along the property line so that, hopefully, I can reclaim some sense of ownership of my backyard [At considerable personal expense and considerable sweat equity of myself and my family in putting in all the new shrubs and trees.] If you can believe it, I have even had strangers walking their dog in my backyard as I am out there myself raking or watering the plants! They have total disregard for the boundary of the path and encourage their pets to relieve themselves among my plants so that they don't soil the public walkway. Hopefully once my plantings grow in heavily enough, these people will

acre in size.

Since living in Seven Lakes, I have taken hundreds of walks from Swaringen Drive to Morris Drive to Longleaf Drive and across the dam and around Andrews Drive or Callis Circle, and I have never encountered more than four or five cars on that entire walk. Now that the dam is closed to motorized vehicles I predict that I would not encounter more than one or two vehicles on the same walk.

If the LTL committee is so determined to create specific walking trails, I would suggest that they purchase several of the inexpensive non-build able lots [those that won't perk] out in Seven Lakes West and make those into parking areas and then just take whichever route suits you best along the established roadways. You should purchase lots within closest proximity to the dam since chances are good that it will only be allowing golf carts, bikes, and pedestrians across it in order to preserve

the integrity of the structure and traffic should be practically non-existent within three quarters of a mile on either side of the dam. Map out various routes that all cross over the dam but that go varying distances before "looping" around and returning to your parking space. You could even paint blue or yellow or red dots on the pavement to repre-

sent different trails.

Forcing your neighbors to give up the privacy of their own yard for you to create a new path is not an option from my point of view and personal experience. We need to respect the rights of individuals and see things from all points of view.

watch the sun set, or rise, and communicate with their neighbors. Now THAT would bring people together in a positive way.


Add handrails to both entrances to the mail house for the convenience and safety of some of our elder residents.

### More information needed on dam plan

Dear Editor:

After attending the last two [SLWLA] public meetings, I am not sure that either side of the dispute over the dam closing is really hearing each other. I would first like to make clear that neither myself, nor anyone else I've heard nor talked with, feels that the dam shouldn't be closed for repairs. Everyone agrees on that point.

I would like to understand the plan going forward. I do understand the Board's standpoint that they do not know what the plan will be until they receive it from the engineering firm. However, I think there is plenty to discuss in absence of the plan.

If the decision to close the dam to vehicles has truly not

been made, then I feel it was a poor choice of words to use "closed indefinitely," which is defined as closed "without fixed or specified limit; unlimited." Due to this wording as well as com-



ments made by the board that they enjoy the dam being closed and that they can "see one day having benches all along it," I feel that the decision has already been made to keep the dam closed despite not having the remediation plan.

I would like to understand all the options that are being considered, the pros and the cons to each, have a meaningful discussion on them, and then a vote [as a community] on the direction to proceed.

Very seldom does a problem only have one solution, and yet as I understand from the meetings, the engineering firm is creating a plan for remediation, which will be reviewed by government agencies and then given to us to execute. As a community member who has been directly impacted by the closing of the dam I would like to understand what the Board is doing to overcome the burden placed on the community as a whole.

If the plan is that after the remediation, the dam will be reopened to vehicles then I am done and happy to wait. If that is not the plan, then I don't understand. The definition of remediation is "to correct a fault or deficiency." So if the fault is being corrected, then why won't vehicles be allowed back on the dam? If the current plan is to really only patch the dam and not repair it, then why was that choice decided on rather than a full repair?

It has been said that it would cost \$8 million dollars to rebuild

the dam today. I would think that there are several intermediate possibilities between a patch and a whole new dam.

If vehicles cannot be allowed back on the dam regardless of the remediation and regular future maintenance, I accept that. However, I do not think it is too much to expect that an alternate route be implemented so that there is an end to the daily hindrance of extra mileage and travel time for residents who can no longer use the dam for passage.

### More information needed on dam liability

Dear Editor:

As a resident of Seven Lakes West, we received a three page copy of a dam report placed in our door where, in one paragraph, it was stated that the landowners in Seven Lakes West could be faced with a "mega million dollar lawsuit" should the dam give way and threaten lives and property downstream; that the Association could not obtain insurance for this "liability;" and, even if they could, the Association would not be able to afford the coverage as they had been told by insurance agents.

In the most recent edition of *The Seven Lakes Times*, it was mentioned in an article that the association did in fact have liability protection from the general liability policy and excess being provided in an umbrella. I have a concern that our Board,

who represents us, the landowners, wasn't abreast of the policies they have secured for the association, as evidenced by contradictory statements being made. It seems like the dam is a pret-



ty important liability issue to have been so vague.

With it being established now that we do indeed have coverage [which again contradicts the three page report delivered to our house], I question the limits purchased for the primary coverage; whether the umbrella is a following form and at what limits and whether measures were taken to obtain multiple quotes for increased limits having been presented with the suggestion of a "mega million dollar lawsuit?"

Given the urgency demonstrated by the immediate closing of the dam roadway, one would assume, given the choice, the residents of Seven Lakes West may favor a moderate increase in premium to elevate limits of liability to protect them over a pro-rated share of a "mega million dollar lawsuit."

I just ask for better representation of the facts before the Board reports to the public they represent.

### SLLA needs strong, professional leadership

Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] Board member, Laura Douglass, is quoted in the last issue of *The Seven Lakes Times* as saying: "I will not sit idly by and allow our children to pay the penalty of playing on outdated and overcrowded recreation areas because longterm planning failed to provide this community with adequate dam and road reserve funds."

Congratulations are in order for her recognizing part of the problem. Many times I have written over the last four years that volunteer boards simply do not have the professional backgrounds to be micro-managing the operation of our community. Some boards are more qualified than others but at best we will not have sufficient levels of professional competence from our volunteer boards to lead us.

I am not, but I am being realistic.Boards should have quality professional leadership from paid management to guide them and we have missed that for 20 years. I will use Mrs. Douglass's point made above to make my point.

She is concerned about a solution to a short-term issue that as she recognized was caused by long-term deficiencies. Why was she not equally outraged and vocal about the root cause of the problem — failure to establish reserves? Why does she not look to the common denominator to the failure of establishing these reserves?

dren to suffer from poor planning in the past. It is disgraceful that she will sit by and not address the real problem. Too many boards have either ignored the real problem or simply not known what it was. This board, by its continu-

ation of existing policy regarding management, is increasing the probability that our problems will only get more unmanageable.





dealt with, if I'm sick I get the benefit, if my wife is sick I don't get paid for that," he said. "I feel like the use of the sick time should only be for the employee."

"What if I have a sick twoyear-old child?" Community Manager Dalton Fulcher responded. "You're not going to give me sick leave to go to the doctor?"

"If you look at the pay scale, the higher the salary the less use of sick leave," Michael Florence said. "The lower the pay scale the more it is being used. maybe we need to remind employees that sick time is for when you are sick."

Both Laura Douglass and Ed Nuti argued that the only change needed was some tougher language developed by Nuti and Fulcher that make abuse of the sick time benefit grounds for immediate dismissal

#### **Christmas bonuses**

Hudson also provided Board Members with data on Christmas bonuses, which are currently set at 1.5 percent of salary and paid to every employee. Fulcher explained that the rate was originally three percent, but that was lowered eight or ten years ago.

Zielsdorf and Douglass both suggested that the bonuses should be tied in some way to performance — perhaps through goal-setting in January against which progress in measured throughout the year.

Nuti encouraged Board members to use employee evaluation sheets he developed.

#### **Multi-Use Court**

Douglass told her fellow Directors that the cost of an additional basketball half-court or "multi-use court" - that her committee had recommended was expected to be \$4,000. It would be placed between the existing volleyball court and tennis courts and make us of a light pole and lights the Association already owns.

Though President Don Truesdell had identified funds in the capital budget that could be allocated for the project, the proposal ran into some unexpected opposition from Stephan, Hudson, and Florence, who appeared to have concluded the "multiuse court" was a skateboarding area in disguise. During the

September SLLA General Meeting, all three helped defeat a motion by Douglass that would have allowed skateboarding on community streets.

"I am very worried about liability," Stephan said, saying she had "a question about something that we should look up."

"It seems to me, if it's ours and we paid for it, we are liable. But what if the parents of the children who would be using this court raised the money to pay for it? Would we no longer be liable?"

"You can dress it up and call it what you want, but it's still a place for skateboarding," Hudson said, noting that he had passed out a letter from the Association's insurer that advised against building the court if it would be used for skateboarding. "If skateboarding and inline skating is so great, why don't they allow it at the schools?" he asked.

Hudson said the community faced a number of unknown expenses in the coming year, including potential repairs to one or more dams. "I don't want to spend any more money right now. Let's hold off and wait on [Dam Engineer] John Eddy's

"I'm kind of with Steve on this," Florence said. "At this time I am going to reserve judgement until we get a number back on the dams."

Douglass said the question facing the Board was not a rules change regarding skateboards but rather the funding of another half court that the Recreation Committee had decided two years ago was something the community needed.

Addressing the concerns expressed about liability, Douglass said skateboarders were limited to the basketball court two years ago and there has been no reported injury in that period. Prior to that, she added, there was skateboarding throughout the community for 30 years, again with no reported injuries resulting in liability for the Association.

Douglass expressed a concern that the opposition to the proposed half court was "petty retribution for bringing up street skating."

"It feels like a personality quar-

rel on the Board," she added.

Assistant Community Manager Chad Beane said the existing basketball court may be the single most used amenity in the community. "On a given evening, that court is packed," he said. "I would encourage building a new court just for the amount of play."

Board members agreed to put the proposed court on the agenda of the October 26 meeting for a vote. Neither Douglass nor Hudson will be at that meeting: so they will vote via email.

#### School bus stops

Fulcher told the Directors that Moore County Schools has asked for four additional school bus stops at point throughout the community. Currently the bus stops only at the Landowners Office and on Seven Lakes Drive in front of the fire station. The matter was put on the agenda of the October 26 meeting for approval.

Police Chief Campbell and be covered by the village insurance policy and receive benefits entitled under the North Carolina Workers Compensation Act.

Munro said the village lawyer had reviewed and approved the ordinance establishing the auxiliary police department, however, after much discussion among the council and residents present at the meeting regarding liability risks incurred by the village, the motion failed in a 3-2 vote with Erickson and Munro

supporting.

Noting that Foxfire has recently added a third member to the Foxfire Police Department, Mayor Erickson suggested the ordinance could warrant further review and input in the future if the village determined that an auxiliary force was needed.

Councilman Munro thanked members of the Public Safety Committee for their hard work.

"Over the last year they have revamped and reworked the police department and it has been a real joy working with this

committee," said Munro.

Munro announced that Patrolman Gregory Rhyner began work on Monday, October 8 and would be riding along with Chief Campbell for the next few weeks. Rhyner was formerly employed



(Continued from page 35) with the Pinehurst Police Department.

Munro also said he has been working to resolve several key public safety issues including speeding, overweight trucks, and barking dogs.

"The county gave us guidelines that recommend over fifteen minutes of barking is considered a nuisance and action can be taken," said Munro. A new barking dog ordinance will be presented to the council for review and vote in November.

Mayor Erickson also addressed speeding concerns during his report and said that Hoffman and Richmond Roads will be included in a traffic study to commence in the next sixty to ninety days.

"If traffic is heavy enough, we may be able to lower the speed limit to 35 mph from the current 45 mph," said Erickson.

Munro said that a special police unit will convene at the end of the month to discuss options regarding overweight trucks using village roads.

#### **Finance**

Councilman Wally Peckitt presented the Finance Report: General Fund at \$307,000; Water Fund at \$99,000; Water Capital Reserve Fund at \$133,000; Police Supplemental Fund at \$14,000.

"We are in the black," reported Peckitt and he encouraged all interested residents to familiarize themselves with the ten-

page finance report produced each month and available for review at the village offices. Peckitt said the independent audit recently completed would also be available for review.

#### **Planning and Zoning**

Foxfire Village currently has thirty-three homes for sale within the town limits, according to a report presented by Mimi Ainsworth, planning and zoning administrator.

There are sixteen new homes under construction and an additional four duplexes under construction on Foxtail Lane.

In September, there were no new applications for residential construction.

#### **Woodland Circle Extension**

Project Manager Tom Collins reported that he met with the soils engineer to review preliminary documentation that will be presented to the Army Corps of Engineers on Monday, October 15.

Expressing appreciation for his valuable expertise and, thus far, unpaid volunteer work overseeing this project, Councilman Peckitt presented a resolution to approve hiring Collins as a paid consultant until completion of this project.

Councilman Munro approved saying, "Collins has given us a tremendous benefit from his expertise and this resolution is long overdue."

Mayor Erickson said the council decided to draft this resolution without Collins input.

"He has a vast background and experience working on these things [civil engineering projects], and we felt it was important that the village have an agent to protect our interests on this project – which will cost over a million dollars. Collins will make sure the specifications of the contract are met."

The council unanimously approved payment to Collins Consulting at a rate not to exceed \$75 per hour.

#### Grande Pines Water Assessment

A public hearing will be held on November 13 at 7:30 pm, on a resolution to extend a water main to homes in the Grande Pines subdivision that are within the village municipal limits.

Four bids were received for the work and a contract was accepted for Sandhills Contractors, Inc. in the amount of \$144,761.25.

Affected homes in the Grande Pines subdivision will be

assessed the full amount payable in cash or in five equal installments bearing an interest rate of eight percent per annum.

#### **Streets**

Responding to concerns over clear cutting of lots during new construction, Councilman Gene Petrie reported he had received documents from the state suggesting that municipalities can draft ordinances for tree protection.

Tom Collins asserted that a state law is already in place that forbids clear cutting.

Councilman Ed Lauer said that the Appearance Committee should have more authority and be able to enforce both the village ordinance and state law forbidding this practice.

"If you take down fifteen trees then you should replant with fifteen other trees," said Laurer.

Unfortunately, much of the clear cutting work is completed prior to construction plans being submitted to the village.

A member of the Appearance Committee said, "Clear cutting is occurring and the Appearance Committee would like to see more enforcement."

#### **Park and Club Relations**

Councilman Munro reported the Foxfire Country Club restaurant received a health department score of 92.5. "We will monitor this in the future to see whether the restaurant is maintaining the



Noting that Directors had received a good bit of input both for and against the proposed trail, Haggard said, "There are strong feelings on both sides of this issue. Some of the strong feelings are about something that nobody has seen."

The stretch of Longleaf in question has only two homes, Haggard said, so the impact on residents' front yards — one of

the key objections to the trail—would be minimal. "Right now everybody is up in arms of something that they can't see, feel, or touch," he added.

Infrastructure Director Ray MacKay suggested tabling Haggard's proposal "until we see the budget. Let's table until we have had our financial health review for next year."

MacKay provided Board members an estimate of maintenance costs associated with the proposed granite fines trail, putting the annual tab at \$3,000 to \$4,000 per mile each year, "assuming only minor maintenance problems occur." Among the more significant components of that cost is spraying the trail with an herbicide — like Round-Up® — two or three times per years to prevent plants from growing in the crush granite surface of the trail. A special spray guard would be used to confine the herbicide to the trail and avoid damage to vegetation on either side.

Directors Blaine Rowland, Kathy Kirst, and Jo Nicholas all agreed with MacKay's suggestion that the issue be tabled until

after the budget is nailed down. Director Mary Anne Fewkes said Secretary Ed Tuton, who was not present for the meeting, had told her he wouldn't support funding the trail at this point because of other demands on community finances.

"If we are going to put it on the back burner we need to give a timeframe about when we will be getting back to Loop the Lake," Fewkes said, noting that, at her request, the LTL comittee has agreed to construct a granite fines trail from the Johnson Point Parking lot to the playground.

"So we'll table it until the December work session," Haggard concluded. "At that time we'll have an up or down vote on something."

### Association owns right-of-way

Exactly how much of my front yard do I own?

That was the essence of a question raised by Westsider Joe Gavala during the Tuesday, October 9 Work Session of the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] Board of Directors.

Noting that he had read about a proposal to put the Loop the Lake [LTL] trail in Association-owned right of way along Longleaf Drive, Gavala told Board members during the public comment portion of the meeting: "My survey shows I own to the street. The Association has a right to come in for utilities. I would like that to be clarified."

The Times spoke with SLWLA Infrastructure Director Ray MacKay after the meeting to better understand the issue.

MacKay said the initial subdivision plats filed with Moore County when the West Side was developed show 60 feet of road right of way — 30 feet on each side of the center line — along most of the private roads in the community, including Longleaf Drive. This right of way is the property of the Association, not individual lot owners.

Longleaf and most other streets are currently 23 feet wide, McKay said, 12.5 feet on either side of the center line, which means the association owns another 17.5 feet on each side of the road — land that is currently unpaved and is being used by the owners of developed lots as though it were part of their front yard.

This right of way is not an easement, MacKay told *The* 

Times; is is, in fact, Association property. It is within this right-of-way that the LTL committee has proposed building a six-foot wide trail.

In addition to the right of way owned by the Association, there is also a 15-foot utility easement running across the front of most lots, MacKay said. This easement — which lies on property that belongs to the lot owner — begins where the road right-of-way ends and extends another 15 feet into the front yard of the landowner.

MacKay said a ride around Longleaf will reveal that most cable and telephone boxes and other utility hardware is located right on the front edge of the property line, just inside this easement.

Munro also reported that the club finances were close to break-even this year.

The Parks and Recreation Committee for the village developed and recently distributed a survey to all residents of Foxfire. Results of this survey are a required component in the grant application process to The N.C. Parks and Recreation Trust Fund [PARTF].

The village has contracted to work again this year with professional grant writer David Hartigan. The contract provides a \$5,000 fee to be paid only if the PARTF grant is awarded.

Mayor Erickson and the committee encourage all residents to complete the survey and return it by mail or in person to the village offices.

Suggestions for placement of a flagpole and permanent benches at Village Park are also welcome and may be included in the survey.

Erickson reported that the walking trail would be repaired by the original construction contractor at a cost of \$3,500.

#### **Public Comment**

A resident expressed concern over abandoned basement foundations left by a building contractor.

"We have two six-year old boys living near there and those basements have a fifteen foot drop plus pipes and steel rods sticking out," the resident said.

Mayor Erickson responded that this matter had been brought to his attention by Mimi Ainsworth and that he had spoken to the developer on the phone followed by a letter as well.

Calling the developer in question "a menace," the resident admonished the mayor and council saying, "We don't want this contractor in our village."

Drive resident, said she had in four days collected the signatures of 204 Westsiders opposed to the LTL trail, including 60 from Longleaf Drive residents, who she said were not willing to maintain the trail where it passes in front of their property, would not be willing to pick up dog droppings deposited along the trail, and were not willing to accept the liability of any accidents that occur on the trail.

"I will be contacting these 60some peope to see if we can get a notarized statement saying you [the Association] are solely repsonsible for that path," Behrens said. "Shotgun lawsuits mean that anyone in the area gets sued. We're all going to be sued. I'm going to be sued because it is in front of my property." "I have a lot of bitter opposition to this," Longleaf Resident Betty Parker told the Board. "I think it is going to be a hazard." She questioned whether anyone would really use the trail, noting that she only sees nearby neighbors walking on her section of Longleaf Drive currently. "If I don't sell my house for the asking price, perhaps I can come back to the Association for compensation," she added.

Joe Gavala questioned whether the Board has the authority to place the trail across the front of his property. "My survey says I own to the street," he said. "I would like that to be clarified." Director MacKay said he would meet with Gavala. MacKay told *The Times* after the meeting that the Association

owns a 60 foot right of way along most of its streets including Longleaf Drive. [See box on page 37 for more detail.]

Tim Niewald, who, with his wife Sherry, is spearheading the LTL effort told the Board that their informal survey of 178 residents had found only three opposed to the trail. "This is a new concept and and new idea," Niewald said. "The LTLT Committee appreciates the comments of those who oppose the trail, because it helps clarify the concept."

He asked Board members and interested residents to visit the website of American Trails and the National Trails Training Partnership at www.americantrails.org, which offers a large amount of information on trail construction, maintenance, and liability issues.

#### Dam repair planning

Lake Director Fewkes told the Board that several committees had been or were being formed to develop plans for various aspects of lake management during the planned repairs to Lake Auman dam next fall. The lake level is expected to be lowered five feet during the repairs.

A Johnson Point Committee has already taken measurements around the boat slips and found that only four slips will be rendered unusable by a five-foot drawdown. Arrangements will be made for the renters of those slips. The committee is also working on a plan for the

(Continued from page 38) boat launching ramp.

Another committee is being formed to look at the impact of the drawdown on coves and develop plans for owners of cove front lots. Former Directors Bud Sales and Paul Kirst will be reviewing the SLWLA Rules and Regulations to see what adjustments should be made to lake rules to allow the lake to continue to be used for recreation during the repair period.

Fewkes said the lake level will not be lowered suddenly, but that the drawdown will be extended over a period of two to three months, in order to allow residents time to make any needed adjustments.

She noted that work will soon begin on a long-planned dam maintenance project that is not related to the repair of the dam core. The Association's dam engineer is beginning to gather bids on that project.

Turning to other lake-related maters, Fewkes said she has been working to identify folks who are subletting their Johnson Point boat slips to others — which is not allowed under community rules and short-cicuits the waiting list process for renting a slip. As a result, the size of the waiting list has been brought down to twenty-one names and the wait has been reduced from three years to two years.

Noting that the current drought conditions have resulted in a lower lake level, Fewkes said she has relaxed some rules enforcement to allow those who can't tie up to their bulkhead to tie up at another resident's property, even if that exceeds the normal two boats per lot restriction.

#### Irrigation from lake

During the public comment segment of the meeting, Gene Lenz, noting that Moore County has imposed Stage 3 Water Conservation, asked the Board to restrict watering from the lake. "The golf course is watering ever day," Lenz said. "They don't need to water the lawn every day."

#### **Community Management**

Former Director Ron Sickenberger, a member of the SLWLA Personnel Committee, reported to the board on the results of his investigation into the possibility of hiring a community management company to handle the Association's administrative functions — as opposed to hiring a manager and other staff directly.

He noted that the Board had asked the Personnel Committee to explore the option in part because current Community Manager Tony Robertson has expressed a desire to retire by the end of next year.

Sickenberger said he had explored the option with John Stone, President of Community Association Services [CAS], a management company with

offices in Pinehurst.

For an estimated fee of "\$1.50 per door per month," in other words, per lot per month, CAS will handle all accounting and backroom services for the association, Sickenberger said. That represents a discount off the company's regular \$2.00 per door price due to the size of the West Side Association. These functions would be handled at CAS headquarters.

CAS will provide a full-time, onsite Community Manager for an estimated annual fee of \$70,000, of which \$14,000 is CAS's management fee — "basically, that's their profit," Sickenberger said. Additional staff could be added essentially at CAS's cost. The company provides full medical benefits and workman's comp coverage. CAS estimates they would save twenty percent over what SLWLA currently spends on insurance.

CAS serves about 240 associations and has North Carolina offices in the Greensboro, Raleigh, and Charlotte areas, Sickenberger said. All the Community Managers they employ are certified. They have "pretty significant information systems capability," he added. The company could provide additional

fill-in staff in periods of heavier workload — for instance, during the spring registration period.

"The bottom line is a little bit foggy," Sickenberger said. "It might be close to being a wash. We would have to look at what the efficiencies created would be."

"The personnel committee is not making any recommendation at this point," he added.

"The Board does a lot of volunteer stuff — infrastructure, lake management, landscaping, and so on, "Treasurer Kathy Kirst said in response to Sickenberger's presentation. "Do they have ways to address these things?" "We realize that Board members have historically and continue to do too much work in the physical sense," Sickenberger said. "We hope this would help address that. Something needs to be done in that regard."

"The idea that CAS is going to bring in one person and replace what is done by everyone around this table is not going to happen," President Haggard argued. "We are all going to continue to do what we are doing. Otherwise, we would be looking at hiring more employees through that company. They could, for example, hire a compliance officer," Haggard said, noting that "the (See "Board," p. 40)



\$14,000 fee is going to be the same no matter how many employees are added on."

"After the budget process is finished, we need to lay out what we have and what we need," Director Ray MacKay said, having the final word on the subject. "It's interesting, but it has more questions than answers at this point."

#### **Other Business**

In other business the SLWA Directors:

- Asked Recreation Director Jo Nicholas to work with Betsy Mikula on improving the billboard situation at the mailhouse. Mikula had sent the Board a letter proposing changes to better organize the display of information.
- Heard from Communty Manager Tony Robertson that an unauthorized entry point in the Morgan Wood area had been closed off.
- Discussed a complaint of excessive noise at Johnson Point during a recent wedding. Board members who had responded to complaints had slightly differing perceptions of how much of a problem the noise was. The Board

asked Security Director Blaine Rowland to develop some language requesting noise control that could be added to the Johnson Point rental agreement

- Heard from Treasurer Kathy Kirst that the outside audit of the Association's books is proceeding apace and is expected to generate some suggestions for modifying SLWLA procedures.
- Heard that the Lake Auman Sports Club would like to pay for half the cost of stocking forage fish in Lake Auman. Sports Club President Charlie Flinchum said the lake has a good bass population but that food for the bass is scarce. The club would like to stock disease-free shiners that could reproduce in the lake and provide food for the bass. Lake Director Mary Anne Fewkes was scheduled to meet with the club Tuesday evening.
- Heard from the Community
  Manager that front gate guards,
  as instructed, are not allowing
  vehicles with West side stickers but no barcodes to enter
  through the barcode-only gate.
  Unfortunately some landowners have not been happy with
  the restriction and have been
  using some "Sunday School

words" when speaking with the guards, Robertson said.

- Heard from Robertson that some residents are not obeying new county prohibitions against irrigation. The county has asked the Association to report infractions. SLWLA staff is warning offenders once before reporting them to the county.
- Heard from Robertson that the Association has cut back its own irrigation at West Side Park — which utilizing lake water — from five days a week to one day a week. The sprinklers will soon be cut off completely, Robertson said, because the grass is going dormant
- Heard from Recreation Director Jo Nicholas that the recent beer tasting event was sold out. She encouraged Board members to participate in the October 31 Trunk or Treat event.
- Heard from Patti Cleary that the Area Reps' emergency phone tree is in place. She asked for Board volunteers to serve as the first-tier callers.
- Heard form Legal Director Hugh Beckwith that local developer Ron Myers is interested in reviving a proposed cluster home development — the Gateway II project — which

would place a number of attached homes on a twelveacre parcel on one side of Gateway Drive near the back gate. Myers had presented the concept at a General Meeting of the Association a year or so ago. The Board discussed having him represent the idea in order to gather community input. A change in the SLWLA covenants would likely be necessary for the project to move forward.

 Received from Treasurer Kirst a historical financial summary and an eight-year projection of proposed capital projects to be used in their development of the FY 2008-2009 budget. The Board will hammer out the budget during a retreat at the Inn at Eagle Springs on Tuesday, November 13.

Stage 3 Mandatory Conservation, which prohibits the watering or sprinkling of "any lawn, grass, trees, shubbery, flowers, golf greens, or vegetable gardens," after the regular Monday, October 1 meeting of the Moore County Board of Commissioners.

The restrictions apply to county water customers in Seven Lakes, McLendon HIIIs, Love Grove, West End, Pinewild, and Pinehurst.

Briefing the Commissioners on the issue, Public Works Director Dennis Brobst said he had rather be accused of pulling the trigger too early than coming back to the Commissioners in a few weeks to report "we're out of water"

Brobst told the Commissioners that the water level in the Middendorf Aquifer — the natural underground reservoir that the County's wells tap into — has dropped 3.23 feet since March. Brobst told *The Times* last month that a three foot decline is one of the "triggers" that could result in the implementation of Stage

3 Water Conservation. The County implemented Stage 1 Voluntary Conservation in Seven Lakes on May 30 and moved to Stage 2 Mandatory Conservation on June 8.

Brobst told Commissioners that the drought afflicting the county continues to deepen. Public Works' month-end data for September shows rainfall in Seven Lakes 9.45 inches below normal and Pinehurst rainfall down 11.74 inches. The US Department of Agriculture reports the that entire state of North Carolina is in drought, with more than 80 of the 100 counties in one of the two most severe categories — extreme or exceptional drought.

Under Stage 3 Mandatory Conservation all irrigation of lawns, gardens, and landscaping is prohibited. Also prohibited are:

- Filling or replenishing any wading pool or swimming pool.
- Making non-essential use of water for commercial or public use.
- · Operating water-cooled air

conditioners or other equipment that does not recycle cooling water.

All industrial, manufacturing, and commercial enterprises are required to reduce consumption with a goal of at least 50 percent. Businesses are required to document their efforts to conserve water.

Stage 3 also incorporates the conservation measures of Stage 1 and 2, which include no washing of automobiles using county water, no use of water to clean driveways and sidewalks, and no use of water for any unnecessary purpose.

Brobst said the county has yet to issue any fines under the water ordinance, but he explained the process so that *The Times* could share it with our readers.

With the first offense, public utilities staffers deliver a warning, either by leaving a door tag, or, if the homeowner is at home, presenting them with a written warning, along with a copy of the ordinance and press release announcing the restrictions.

A second offense results in a

\$50 fine, delivered by the Sheriff's Office. A third offense results in a \$500 fine and involves a criminal citation.

After that, if the violation doesn't stop after 48 hours, Public Works has the right to disconnect the offender from the water system. Brobst said this provision is, in part, to deal with someone who, for example, has left town for an extended trip and left their sprinkler system on.
