County faces 5% budget cut

Early this year, the Moore County Board of Commissioners set their goals for the Fiscal Year 2010-2011 budget: a three to five percent reduction in spending and a tax cut in the property tax rate of up to two cents. County Manger Cary McSwain and his budget committee came close to meeting those goals in draft budget delivered to the Commissioners during their Monday, May 3 regular meeting.

McSwain's budget cuts spending from \$89.4 million to \$84.9 million, a \$4.4 million, or 4.98 percent reduction, despite substantial increases in spending mandated by the state and federal governments.

Though he did not manage to cut taxes in his proposed budget, McSwain did forgo any tax increase, leaving the tax rate on real and personal property at 46.5 cents per hundred dollars of valuation and the Advanced Life Support levy, which supports the county's Emergency Medical Services efforts, at two cents

If the Manager's budget stands as presented, some Seven Lakers could see a tiny increase in property taxes resulting from a increase in the fire tax rate by two tenths of one cent.

School, College budgets cut

McSwain's budget fails to fund the full local budget contribution requested by Moore County Schools and Sandhills Community College [SCC], both of which rely on a combination of county, state, and federal funding. Spending on education represents about 36 percent of the county budget.

SLLA may double builders' compliance fees

Builders may soon face an increased Compliance Fee and, consequently, stiffer penalties for not adhering to Architectural Review Board [ARB] regulations.

Currently set at \$1,500, the Compliance Fee is so low that builders will opt to lose the fee as a penalty rather than to correct the violation, ARB Director Melinda Scott explained at the Monday, May 3, Work Session of the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] Board.

"The builders are weighing the violation – how much will we lose to do this versus how much will it cost to do that," she said Scott recommended doubling the Compliance Fee to \$3,000 and requiring written notification from the builder that failure to comply with ARB regulations could result in the loss of some, or all, of the fee.

President Randy Zielsdorf questioned whether \$3,000 was high enough to serve as an incentive; however, Treasurer Denny Galford cautioned against raising fees beyond the norm of surrounding communities.

"I want to make sure our rules don't make it unfavorable to construct homes [in Seven Lakes]," Galford said. "There are a number of buildable lots on the Southside that are less favorable. I don't want to create a situation where these lots are never develoned"

Scott responded that the fee is not meant to be punitive, but in place to enforce existing ARB rules and regulations. When a building application is received, ARB provides the builder with a condensed book of all applicable rules.

Continuing her report, Scott (See "SLLA Work Session," p. 30)

Armed bandits hit Peking Wok after hours

A owner and an employee of Peking Wok restaurant in Seven Lakes were held up at gunpoint Monday night, May 11, after closing. Detective Eric Galloway told The Times that officers have little to go on in identifying the suspects and encouraged anyone who saw anything that might provide a lead in the case to immediately contact the Moore County Sheriff's Office.

According to an incident report filed by Officer Jesse Robbins, Peking Wok employee Zhong Huang, of Seven Lakes North, was exiting the restaurant through the front door at about 9:30 pm, Monday night, when he was confronted by two African American men, clothed all in black, carrying rifles or shotguns.

After stopping Huang, one of the men entered the restaurant and confronted owner Aiyou Jiang, also of Seven Lakes North, demanding money. The assailants ultimately made off with approximately \$300 in cash, the cell phones of both Huang and Jiang, a drivers license and a credit card. Before leaving the scene on foot, they ordered Huang to remove two twenty-ounce Fanta orange drinks from

the refrigerator and place them in a red backpack.

Both men were described as African American, of thin build and medium height, and were wearing black shirts, pants, shoes, and gloves, with black masks that revealed only their eyes. One carried a black rifle or shotgun; the other a rifle or shotgun with a light-colored wooden stock.

They fled the scene on foot,

traveling toward Lakeway Drive. A police dog followed their trail into The Pinnacle neighborhood in Seven Lakes West, but officers were unable to determine if they had actually entered the neighborhood or circled back through

the woods to make their escape. No other crimes involving similarly-clothed suspects were reported Monday night, and Detective Galloway told *The Times* investigators are badly in need of leads. Anyone with information that might be helpful should contact the Sheriff's office immediately, at 910-947-2931.

Correction

The Times reported in our April 30 edition that the Seven Lakes Country Club [SLCC] declined an offer by The Seven Lakes Chapel in the Pines to purchase the old driving range. While representatives from each side did meet and an asking price was discussed, no offer was ever made — thus no offer was declined.

In the same article, *The Times* also incorrectly reported that a lawsuit spurred by the agreement between SLCC and the Seven Lakes Landowners Association was decided on appeal. In fact, the lawsuit was was dismissed on summary judgement in favor of the Club and SLLA, and that ruling was not appealed.



New dues payment process ruffles feathers

Change is seldom easy, and changing the way that West-siders are billed for and pay their landowners dues this year has not been without its difficulties — including more than one irate call to the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] office.

Noting that Board members had received numerous emails from members questioning the

useful, the use of the term created confusion, and we shouldn't have done it."

"It is also unfortunate that I missed the fact that, if you add up the coupons, the total is different from the annual dues. That was a stupid mistake."

"We are at fault, and we should not be quite so defensive," Sikes said. "It is not our job to lecture the membership, but rather to serve the membership."

Paying the \$74.59 per month

printed on the coupons results in a twelve month total of \$895.08; SLWLA dues for this year are \$895. Sikes suggested the Association not attempt to repair the problem by

issuing new coupon books.

move to a dues payment coupon book and a "lockbox" address for payments, President Ron Shepard explained during the Board's Tuesday, May 11 Work Session that "the lockbox is administratively and financially a smart thing for us to do."

"Lockbox," in this instance, refers to a service offered by a bank, in which the bank accepts and deposits Association receivables, instead of having them first pass through the landowners office.

"This saves us time and money," Shepard said, noting that in past years the SLWLA office staff had to manually tabulate checks received and take the deposit to the bank. "Now the money is put into our account immediately; there's no delay with it sitting in the office."

"As with any new system," Shepard said, there will be a few bugs."

He encouraged landowners who encounter problems with or have questions about the new payment system to contact the office. "But there's no reason for anyone to call in with an ugly attitude and immediately start swearing," Shepard added. "We've instructed the office staff to simply hang up if this occurs."

Though he agreed with Shepard that there is no excuse for landowners calling up and abusing the staff, Treasurer Joe Sikes said the transition to monthly payments mailed to the bank could have been handled better.

"'LockBox' is a bit of jargon," Sikes said, "and, while it may be Community Manager Joan Frost explained to The Times on Wednesday that the annual dues total of \$895 is not evenly divisible by twelve. The budget review made necessary by a negative vote on the budget tightened the window for having coupon books printed and allowed no time for the Board to revisit the fee schedule in order to approve a dues amount that divided neatly into twelve pay-

Pool passes available after May 15

ments.

Frost reported during the work session that pool passes for the upcoming season have been received and will be passed out to landowners next week. The cards have been pre-printed with the lot number and landowners name.

Each landowner card, issued to the two primary owners of the lot, will entitle that person to bring up to four guests to the pool. Landowners who want to bring more than four guests at a time will need to purchase one-day guest passes for five dollars.

"Nanny cards," which will allow nannies and babysitters to bring resident children to the pool, will be available for \$50 for the season.

Both guest cards and nanny cards must be purchased at the Landowners Office during regular business hours. They will not be available from the pool gate attendant.

Stop Signs on Longleaf?

Safety & Security Director John Hoffmann said he is still seeking input on a proposal to slow speeding on Longleaf Drive by installing stop signs at various intersections. But, aside from a well-thought-out set of comments from one resident, public input has been hard to come

by. He encouraged residents to contact him in the next couple of weeks, before he brings back a proposal to the Board for discussion and a vote.

Hoffmann noted that Seven Lakes West's status as a private gated community with private roads exempts it from federal highway signage standards. Many private communities use more attractive — though still effective — signage, he said.

Noting that he had written a Standard Operating Procedure for access control at the gates,

Woodland Circle Extension complete . . . almost

Asphalt paving is complete and erosion control devices have been installed on the Woodland Circle Extension project - but there is a problem.

"Atrocious," is how consultant Tom Collins described the quality of the permanent erosion control, and said there are unanswered questions about the quality of the asphalt.

Addressing the Foxfire Village Council on Tuesday, May 11, Collins recommended withholding payment to the general contractor for the placement and labor expenses of the asphalt until the quality problems are

"I can't specifically address those problems, because the contractor has not responded," said Collins, also refusing to estimate a completion date of the project because of the lack of cooperation from the contrac-

Collins said he has requested that NC Department of Water Quality be on-site while the work is being completed, since they control final approval over the project.

Adequate police coverage?

With money available in the current budget, but no set future funding or plan in place, members of the Foxfire Council continued to spar over a proposal to hire a part-time officer to supplement the existing two-man

Councilwoman Page Coker has recommended hiring a third officer to work two ten-hour staggered shifts each week that would allow some police coverage every day of the week.

However, Councilmen Ed Lauer and Vic Koos have

expressed skepticism over the ancillary costs to the proposed plan and whether more ongoing coverage is needed.

"I keep hearing about a coverage problem. Another officer will not answer these issues," said Lauer, questioning whether there is actual need to justify the expense.

Several years ago, a previous Council approved and hired a third fulltime officer, but that position has sat vacant for some

Responding to a question from a resident, Coker said the position was not filled because she was unwilling to fund hiring and then training a new officer. As currently proposed, candidates for the part-time position must be already trained and certified. No benefits would be offered and Coker's recommendation is to fund the position with salary set-aside for the now vacant Zoning Administrator position.

"I want our police officers being seen to prevent crime from happening. I am just being proactive," Coker said.

During public comment, the Council heard from residents in favor of and opposed to hiring additional police officers.

A final decision on the police proposal is anticipated to coincide with approval of the FY 2010-2011 Budget. A public hearing will be held on Tuesday, June 8 at 6:00 pm at Town Hall.

Public Safety

Trying to be as lenient as possible while providing Foxfire Village with necessary protection for liability, Coker presented a proposed Golf Cart ordinance.

In summary, the ordinance

would require golf carts to be operated only on public roads with a speed limit not greater than 35 mph, by a licensed driver. Golf carts may cross but not drive on Hoffman or Richmond Roads, and must adhere to all traffic flow patterns and in accordance with all applicable state and local laws. A complete copy of the proposed ordinance can be obtained on the website at www.foxfirenc.com

West End Fire & Rescue received grant funding that will allow for installation of a two-hour firewall in the sleeping quarters of the Foxfire Fire Department. Once in place, the facility will be staffed 24/7.

"Nothing could have come at

a better time with the calls we've been receiving," said Coker.

Responding to a rumor that Foxfire Police provided a Village resident with transportation to the airport, Coker said that Foxfire Police have not and will not ever provide transportation while on duty.

"When they are off-duty and use their own time, just like anyone else they can take anyone anyplace in their own personal vehicle," said Coker.

Water

Despite a wet Winter, Lauer reported that eight North Carolina counties are already in drought conditions and said that Foxfire

Citizens turn out for forum on incorporation

About one hundred citizens turned out for a Thursday, May 6, forum convened by IncorporateSevenLakes.com that featured guest speaker Kara Millonzi, Assistant Professor of Public Law and Government, at the University of North Carolina's School of Government. Millonzi is one of the authors of Incorporation of a North Carolina Town, the bible on the incorporation sprocess in the state.

After a brief introduction by Northsider Randy Merritt, one of the founders of IncoporateSevenLakes.com, most of the meeting was devoted to an extensive question and answer session.

Why incoporate?

Why incorporate Seven Lakes? "We are trying accomplish for the gated communities what they can't accomplish for themelves," Merritt said. "To keep from being annexed by the nearby towns of Pinehurst and Foxfire."

"Some say that Pinehurst and Foxfire aren't knocking at our door," Merrit continued. "If they aren't planning to extend their borders, then why are they making annexation agreements between the two of them?"

Merritt noted that the Pinehurst Village limits are just slightly more than three miles from what would become the town limit of Seven Lakes. If a new town wants to incorporate within three miles of the limits of an existing town, the existing town has to pass a resolution supporting the incorporation.

By incoporating now, Seven Lakes can "prevent prevent intrusion by anyone else forever," Merritt said. "We can control our own destiny."

"Right now we have no legal voice with the county," he continued. "We don't have a seat at the table. We don't have a say right now."

Among other advantages of incorporation, Merritt cited:

- The ability to use a municipal zoning ordinance and extraterritorial jurisdiction to control development within and around Seven Lakes.
- The opportunity to access some, though not all, streams of revenue that the state shares with municipalities.
- The ability to use that revenue to improve streets in the business area.
- The opportunity to apply for state and federal grants available to municipalities.

"We want to try to keep the government of Seven Lakes small," Merritt said.

Speaking of IncoporateSevenLakes.com, Merritt said, "We

aren't the people who are going to be running the town. You are going to be the elected officials. You are either going to be those people or elect those people."

Questions

With that introduction, Merritt opened the floor to questions, which were fielded by Merritt,

from incorporating, if you meet the requirements in the statute."

"The issue with the gates is funding streams from the state," she continued. "The General Assembly made a determination that they don't want to encourage gated communities to incorporate." To discourage that, they took away certain streams

said

Millonzi noted that an area can incorporate only if it can persuade its NC Senator and/or Representative (in this case, Harris Blake and Jamie Boles) to introduce a bill in the General Assembly incorporating the town.

Marks said both Blake and Boles attended the first organizational meeting of Incoporate-SevenLakes.com and expressed their willingness to work with the community on the process.

"The only thing I can tell you is if your local representatives want to support incorporation, it will happen, no matter what," Millonzi said. "If they don't want it to happen, then it won't happen."

"Ultimately, it is really in the hands of your local representatives."

Q. If we took down the gates, would the lakes still be private?

Millonzi. "If they are currently (See "ncorporation," p. 22)

Another \$1 million in budget cuts for MCS

Faced with a proposed three percent reduction in the local schools budget request, a \$1.1 million loss of state funding and the potential for \$1.7 million more in state cuts, Superintendent Dr. Susan Purser presented a grim report to the Moore County Board of Education on Monday, May 10.

County Manager Cary McSwain's proposed budget recommendation to the County Commissioners fully funds anticipated increases to open and operate the two new school facilities and the state-mandated increases to the retirement and health insurances rates, but cuts the rest of the schools budget by three percent. The result is a \$26.3 million local schools budget, which is \$604,000 over last year's request, but still falls over one million short of the original \$27.4 million MCS asked for.

Purser expressed frustration, stating that the schools have already absorbed considerable cuts at the state level over the past two years and have made considerable efforts to incorporate responsible ways to reduce expenses.

In 2007-2008, Moore County Schools lost \$1.2 million in state reversions, and then another \$2.5 million in cuts in 2009-2010, which resulted in the loss of fifty positions. This year the school has been told to anticipate another \$1.1 million in state cuts, with the potential of another \$1.7 million in reductions.

"In the time period since 2007-2008 to now, we have dealt with \$4.8 million in cuts. This is an ongoing loss that we experience," said Purser.

Anticipating the loss of \$5.2 million in Federal stimulus funding next year, Purser estimated a potential combined revenue reduction of \$11.7 million, representing a 10.7 decrease or, put more simply, the equivalent of the entire staff of four or five county schools.

Purser's said the budget proposal by McSwain reduced current expenses by \$727,341 and the local capital outlay by \$22,018. She said during last year's budget process, the county had promised \$400,000 in interest earned on proceeds from the sale of education bonds.

With that interest money eliminated from the proposed budget, Purser said, total county funding had been reduced by \$1,149,359.

When combined with state cuts, she said, Moore County Schools are looking at a combined loss of \$2.6 million in next year's budget.

"We are looking at how we can adapt to these numbers with minimal impact on positions. Our first priority is always classroom teachers," said Purser. "We will be doing everything possibly can that we do not lose sight of the most important people in Moore County — and that is the children."

Longtime Board Member Sue Black also expressed concern about losing more positions.

"We have to be realistic. We \$28,782,000. One hundred percan't let go of bus drivers. We can't let go of cafeteria workers. Pretty soon you're going to make it to the classroom," she said.

A Public Hearing on the proposed budget will be heard by the County Commissioners on Monday, May 17 at 6:00 pm, in the Historic Courthouse in Carthage.

2009-2010 **Budget amendments**

Anticipated increases of \$96,000 were received from the state, for an amended state budget of \$59,119,798, reported Finance Director Mike Griffin. In addition, an \$87,000 increase received from Federal Impact Aid amended the local current fund from \$28,695,000 to

"We are consistently and constantly looking at ways to stretch our resource dollars. We are really being frugal and trying to get the most out of the resources we have," said Griffin.

He reported that the state budget is ninety-three percent spent and the local budget is sixty-eight percent spent, explaining that state resources are strategically spent first, allowing any savings to be reaped by the local current fund.

Planning Board approves West Pine modulars

by Laura Douglass Times Reporter

Three modular classroom units will be added to the West Pine Middle School campus, as approved by the Moore County Planning Board on Thursday, May 6.

With a current enrollment of 828 students and 74 employees, the proposed units will not increase student capacity but will be used for new academic programming.

The three units, which were recycled from another Moore County elementary school campus that recently underwent expansion, will be located behind the school facility, and existing playgrounds, lighting and buffering will not be affected.

Woodworking approved

A conditional use permit to allow woodworking on two adjoining Seven Lakes Business Village parcels received unanimous approval.

Currently vacant and undeveloped, the two lots total .69 acres and are located at 140 Auman Road, approximately 400 feet from its intersection with Trade Street.

As approved, no outdoor storage will be allowed and a six-foot privacy fence will be erected along all property lines.

The applicant, Chris Koltyk, is the director of Moore County's Geographic Information Systems Department and has served

as the interim director of Moore County Planning and Community Development.

Home Occupations

Looking to increase flexibility in the approval process required for property owners to own and operate a business from their home, the Planning Board engaged in a lengthy discussion of amendments to the ordinance that would address some of the more unique requests for land use that have been raised over the last few years.

Using recommendations developed by Planning staff, the proposed ordinance reclassifies home occupations into two categories: normal home occupations and intensive home businesses

Normal home occupations are limited to 25% of the gross floor area of the principal structure and allow for only one fulltime non-occupant employee.

Intensive home businesses must maintain the residential character of the neighborhood and are limited to 50% of the gross floor area of the principal structure. More than one non-resident employee is permitted and a buffer must sufficiently screen the home from any adjoining properties. Accessory structures must be located in the rear yard at least 50 feet from any adjoining property or right of way.

Commissioner Morgan defeated in primary

Perhaps the most surprising result of the Tuesday, May 4 primary elections was the defeat of incumbent District III County Commissioner Cindy Morgan of Eagle Springs by newcomer Craig Kennedy of the Robbins area in the GOP contest.

According to unofficial results published by the Moore County Board of Elections, Kennedy, a truck driver for chicken-producer Mountaire Farms, took 53 percent of the vote, versus 47 percent for Morgan, who first joined the Board four years ago. Kennedy, a Moore County native who has held management positions with FedEx, currently faces no opposition in the November general election.

Turnout for the primary election was very light, with only sixteen percent of eligible voters casting ballots.

In other races, Commissioner Morgan's husband, former NC House Speaker Richard Morgan, failed in his bid to unseat State Senator Harris Blake, with Blake capturing over two-thirds of the votes in the Senate District 22 GOP primary.

Veteran incumbent US Congressman Howard Coble was similarly able to hold off a raft of GOP challengers, winning 54 percent of the primary votes. Incumbent Republican US Senator Richard Burr managed an even more decisive trouncing of his primary opponents, taking 80% of votes cast statewide.

But the Democratic Primary to decide who Burr will face in the fall yielded inconclusive results that will require a runoff between current NC Secretary of State Elaine Marshall, who took 36 percent of the vote statewide, and Cal Cunningham, who claimed 27 percent. Since neither garnered more than 50 percent of the vote, they will face each other in a runoff primary scheduled for June 22.

The presence of seven candidates in a race for three at-large seats on the Moore County Board of Education required a primary election in that race to eliminate one candidate, who turned out to be Thomas Jones. The remaining six will compete again in November.

Among those, the top vote getters were incumbents Dale Frye and Sue Black. But challengers Karen Wicker and Enola Lineberger both collected more

votes than incumbent school board member Pam Thompson.

Turnout in Seven Lakes on election day was better-than average, at nineteen percent.



He has been at UNC-TV since 1992, and currently oversees a yearly budget of \$27.7M. Fortyfive percent of that budget comes from the State of NC, and another ten percent comes from the Federal Government.

That leaves forty-five percent that must be raised from the public, and the reason why its annual fund raising effort is so vital to the survival of this Public TV station.

Interestingly, Howe has been able to determine that ninetythree percent of the viewers are non-contributors.

One of its more successful programming efforts is directed at children. Eighty-five percent of preschoolers watch the chil-

dren's programs — but the kids probably don't contribute too much!

Keeping up with the constantly evolving technology of our day is a major challenge for the station, not only from the basis of the technical challenges but, perhaps even more difficult, is to stay abreast of the needs and choices of the younger genera-

The Federal Communications Commission controls the spectrum of frequencies available to anyone who is transmitting, and

if someone new enters the field, it is not uncommon that transmitting time is made available to a newcomer by taking away time from other existing operations.



7 Lakes Lions offer vision screenings on June 5

Area residents will be offered free eye screening when the North Carolina Lions' "See the 21st Century Van" will be in Seven Lakes on Saturday, June 5. This \$25,000 state of the art mobile screening unit will provide screening for visual acuity and a variety of eye diseases and disorders.

Some of these maladies can have serious consequences and often provide no warning symptoms. Early detection is the mission of the van and may prevent the loss of sight.

The van will be in the Seven Lakes Food Lion parking lot from 9 am to 3 pm. Residents of all ages are welcome, persons under 18 must have a parent or guardian provide written consent for the screening.

The van is owned and operated by the Lions of North Carolina through the North Carolina Lion Foundation. It travels though out the state visiting communities at the request of local Lions Clubs. The Seven Lakes Lions Club is sponsoring this screening.

The van was purchased in June 1999 with funds raised by individual clubs and grants from Lions Clubs International and the Kate B. Reynolds Foundation. Assistance in equipping the vehicle was provided by the Duke Eye Center.

Anton wins national championship

Blake Anton, grandson of Marjorie and Harold Blake of Seven Lakes, brought home the Stars and Stripes cycling jersey from the National Collegiate Cycling Championship this past Mother's Day weekend.

Anton, an Architecture major at California Polytechnic University in San Luis Obispo, CA, won the men's class D-1 event in the three-day cycling meet that brought riders from over fifty colleges to compete in Madison, WI.

Anton has been racing bikes for nine years and was accompanied to the meet by his mother, Joan Blake Anton. They arrived at Blue Mound State Park around 7:00 am Friday morning for the 72-mile road race in the chilly 42 degree, rainy and gusty weather.

The rain-slicked roadways were made even more treach-

Anton and his two teamates, Menso de Jong and John Bennett worked out a strategy prior to the race that would have had Anton, thought to be the lesser climber of the group, sacrificing himself in an effort to lead his comrades up the steep inclines. But Anton proved the stronger rider.

The frigid temperatures took their toll, as many reiders dropped out of the race. At the finish line, the announcer told the waiting crowd that a two-man break had come off the front of the pack with about 6 miles to go. The last mile of the course was mostly steep uphill climbs. As the two lead riders approached the finish line, one was Cal Poly rider Blake Anton, passing a Colorado State University rider right at the very end.

At the awards ceremony on Saturday night, Blake received the stars and stripes cycling jersey, identifying him as a US National Champion.

Q. If the community is incorporated, will we have a municipal police department?

Millonzi. "That is not automatic. The only service you have to provide is building code inspections. The rest is left up to your officers [i.e., town council]. They will determine what services the town would provide, one of which could be police service."

Marks pointed out that, although building inspection is the only service the town is required by statute to provide, in order to access state-shared Powell Bill funds from the gasoline tax, the town must provide four services from a list of eight.

Millonzi. To get state money, you have to do five things: conduct elections, adopt a budget, assess at least a five cent property tax, collect those taxes, and

appropriate funds for at least four of eight services, which can include fire protection, police protection, street lights, street maintenance, street construction, water distribution, zoning, and solid waste management.

"You have to choose four of the eight services to provide, in order to get that pot of money," Millonzi explained. "If you keep your gates, the only pot of money you can get from the state is Powell Bill funds. All the others require you to have a majority of your roads open to the public.

Q. Can we contract services - hire the sheriff's department to be our police, hire county zoning to do zoning.

Millonzi. "Yes. The new municipality only has to appropriate funds to pay for the service. All municipalities can provide those services directly or contract with any other entity to provide them."

Q. How can the Powell Bill funds be used?

Millonzi. "They are restricted. You can only use those Powell Bill funds to do street and sidewalk repairs, street and sidewalk construction. None could be used on private streets, or county or state-owned streets."

Q. If we have police, how would that be funded?

Millonzi. "You can use property tax to raise funds." Other options include a local vehicle tax of up to five dollars per vehicle, local business taxes (called a "privilege tax"), and various fees, e.g., recreation fees, inspection fees, plat approval fees.

Darrell Marks noted that "every nickel on the tax rate is \$500,000 in town revenue per year."

Q. Within the gated communities, we have fees for new buildings. Can the town charge fees in addition to those?

Millonzi. "Whatever the association charges, they continue to charge. The town fees are over and above."

Q. Why is the tax rate five cents?

Millonzi. "Five cents is the minimum to qualify for state shared revenue. To get Powell Bill funds, you have to have a tax rate of at least five cents per hundred. The maximum is \$1.50. Whether and how often it can be changed depends on what is in your charter. If your charter is silent, then your governing board will need to adopt a property tax rate."

Merritt noted that the proposed Seven Lakes charter includes a five cent tax rate and limits tax increases to five percent per year.

At that rate, "it take fifteen years for that nickel to become a dime," Marks added. "When you have three gated communities, the town should have a small tightly run government."

Q. How much Powell Bill money we are talking about?
Merritt. "We think it will amount to \$100,000 per year."

Q. Where did you come up with the estimate that the proposed town as a billion dollar tax value?

Merritt. "From the Moore County tax department; the billion includes vehicle taxes." He noted that the actual total is \$954,305.

Q. If we incorporate, can we still take our trash to county convenience centers?

Millonzi. "If your new town decides to provide garbage hauling, it can provide that. The Board can mandate that everyone use it. But It doesn't have to do that."

"You can still continue to bring your garbage to the county landfill. The county could charge you more — as a non-resident. But that doesn't mean they will."

Q. Who writes the charter? How much say do residents have in that?

Merritt explained that he had written the proposed charter, based on studying a number of other town charters, as well as templates provided in the book Millonzi co-authored.

"There's nothing crazy in there," he added, noting that the text could be found on the IncorporateSevenLakes.com website.

More public input needed on incorporation

Dear Editor:

I attended the presentation on incorporation Thursday night, and although I went in unsure where I stood on the issue, but after listening carefully, I am now leaning against it. I heard several things that were bothersome:

1. Randy Merritt opened by saying he had heard many comments about the inadequacy of the budget, but not to take it too seriously since it was a work in progress (I can't recall his precise words, but this captures the gist of it). I find this very disquieting since the five cents a hundred is basic to the whole premise, and it is at best disingenuous to

guarantee a tax rate without a munity on the charter, but I heard good handle on the budget. Since I, among many others, do not believe that their budget is close to realistic. the whole five cents a hundred is called into question. People are signing petitions based on this promise, and I think a better answer is deserved and required.

2. Merritt has written the charter for the new incorporated entity without any input from the community. If we are incorporated, we could wind up having to live with a charter on which we had no input whatsoever. The committee suggested that they could solicit input from the comno assurance that they intended to do so. Once we are incorporated, it takes an act of the state legislature to change the charter, so the hurtle for change is steep.

He assured us that the there was nothing "strange" (his word) in the charter, but limiting the annual tax increase to five percent is in fact quite unusual, as the invited incorporation expert from UNC stated. I know no one likes taxes, but tying the hands of our future governing body by putting such a strict constraint in the charter seems to be a fiduciary irresponsibility (which is reinforced by the fact that very few communities do it). Further, if monies are needed to meet budgetary requirements, this restriction could force tax assessments above and beyond the

3. Apparently, the process by the overwhelming majority of residents are opposed! I don't know how likely this is, but it is possible, and scary.

do us (the gated communities) no good.

5. The invited expert suggested that there is an impetus in the state legislature to end involuntary annexation (NC is one of the few states that allow it). There is certainly no guarantee, but if that happens, the primary motivation for incorporation — fear of annexation by an outside entity - is removed. We will then wind up with an extra layer of taxes and government bureaucracy for no adequate reason.

For this reason alone, I think any consideration of incorporation is at best premature.

The committee did an excellent job and incorporation may be right, but I think it behooves all of us to understand the consequences before we leap into it.



our normal range, but this becomes a high use time, keep in mind the restrictions on watering," cautioned Lauer.

Those restrictions include spray irrigation only between the hours of midnight and 10:00 am, odd numbered properties may water on Mondays and Thursdays, even numbered properties may water on Tuesdays and Fridays. Hand-held and hose end sprinkling is permitted from 6:00-10:00 in the mornings and evenings.

Streets

With \$40,000 in Powell Bill funds available for road maintenance projects, Koos said using the 2005 ITRE report on Village roads, he inspected and then prioritized problem areas.

Koos expressed frustration over Tom Collins report earlier in the meeting, when he cited quality issues with the pavement contractor.

"The reason they were hired was because they were cheaper and they were already onsite working at Woodland. There was no [prior] communication that there was any unhappiness or problems," he said.

Koos reported that blacktop

work would continue at Pine Top Court, Pine Glen Court, Pine Ridge Court, and along Pine Ridge Drive between those cul-de-sacs.

Shut-off valves along the road that had been previously covered over, were dug-out and risers will be installed to prevent a future occurrence.

Koos said there are more roads in need of repair that will be recommended in the future.

"We couldn't do all the roads we wanted to because we don't have the money. We're doing the best we can," said Koos.

Fatal accident near Foxfire

Speeding was a factor in an early morning fatal accident on Friday, April 30, confirmed Chief Mike Campbell of the Foxfire Police

He estimated the driver killed, a thirty-six year old Pinehurst resident, had been traveling at least 70 miles per hour, heading west on Foxfire Road when he crossed the center line and struck a semi tractor-trailer headon. The driver of the truck was not speeding. The accident occurred almost within sight of the Foxfire Village administrative offices, at the curve before Tie Road where the 55 mph zone drops to 40 mph.

This is the second traffic fatality in Foxfire this year; however, speeding was not a factor in the January accident at the intersection of Hoffman and Foxfire Roads that killed an elderly Laurinburg resident and his sister.

Last year, North Carolina Department of Transportation [NC-DOT] conducted a speed zone-traffic study and declined a request by the Foxfire Council to reduce the speed limit on

state-maintained roads that crisscross within the municipal limits. According to NC-DOT, they look at several criteria when setting speed limits including roadway alignment, sight distance, the weighted average speed, crash history, and development.

Councilwoman Page Coker reported that Foxfire Police try to be as visible as possible to discourage speeding and that State Highway Patrol has stepped up their enforcement and are actively stopping and weighing commercial trucks.

"Speeding continues to be a problem. I have seen Village residents slowing down and that is good," said Coker. "The more we slow down, the more we can slow down others behind us."

(Continued from front page) said her committee has updated two standard ARB request forms to a more user-friendly format and that builders must also notify the office prior to pouring building footings so that setbacks can be inspected.

SLLA computer upgrades

Following up on a discussion last month on upgrading SLLA office computers and comparing

the cost and value of purchasing single-use 'dumb terminals' connected to a Talis-based Citrix server versus desktop-style computers, Community Manager Alina Cochran recommended opting for the traditional approach.

"Purchasing new computers would resolve both the data and systems issues," she said, presenting a \$4,500 proposal that included three units and software, but not IT support.

The Board agreed with her assessment that new computers were the preferred option, but balked at the cost.

Zielsdorf noted at least two major computer vendors that offer several years worth of free service with a purchase and also recommended the proposal should only include replacement of old tube monitors: any existing LCD monitors should be maintained.

Gate access for Westside residents

A recent decision by the Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] to eliminate windshield stickers in favor of required barcodes for their residents has created a bit of confusion on how each side will continue to grant access through their respective gates. that the new monthly payment system for dues had produced a minor "cash flow squeeze" early in the month that he solved by moving some funds from a First Bank account.

- Sikes said he planned to continue the pattern of having the Association books audited every other year, alternating with a less formal accountant's review in the off years.
- The Board deferred a discussion on a landowners proposal to build a fishing platform for one of the Westside ponds in order to give Directors Wimberly and Silberhorn additional time to work on the issue.
- ARC Director Wimberly said his committee is beginning to work through a number of cases in which landowners have, for example, installed fences, without the approval of the Architectural Review Committee. Legal Director Silberhorn noted that there is a six-year statute of limitations on rules violations.
- Director Herdrich said a recent controlled burn on Pine Island resulted in damage to

the islands bulkheads, which volunteers are now repairing. Annual or semi-annual burning helps promote desirable plant life on the island, Herdrich explained, and also can discourage nesting by resident Canada Geese.

- Herdrich said former SLWLA President Mary Anne Fewkes journeyed to Raleigh to present to state engineers Lake Auman Dam emergency action plans that she had prepared in response to a request from the state. State officials were so impressed with Fewkes' work that they plan to use the Lake Aumn plan as a model for other dams in the state.
- The Board voted to allow undeveloped lot 5450 to revert to developer status, which means it will not be assessed landowners dues. Legal Director Silberhorn explained that developer Lakeside Development had, two years ago, in order to facilitate a sale, allowed the buyer to have access to the amenities via that undeveloped lot. The Board's vote to allow the reversion included a caveat that the developer not repeat that arrangement in

the future.

- Director Hoffmann announced that he would like to put together a small ad hoc committee to explore making some low cost improvements to the Lakeway Drive mailhouse, utilizing volunteer labor and with the Association covering only the cost of materials.
- After meeting in Executive Session to discuss legal matters, the Board:
- Authorized President Shepard to write a status letter to Developer John Garner asking him for his suggestions in moving forward with the annexation of the Parkwood neighborhood.
- The Board also asked the Developer Lawsuit Negotiating Committee to work with Developer Lakeside Development on an arrangement for the payment of future security fees.



the others windshield stickers until a permanent reciprocal agreement is developed.

Cochran had previously recommended three possible options to control future access: create a special Westside windshield sticker that could be purchased, allow Westsiders to purchase SLLA barcodes, or to program existing SLWLA barcodes into the SLLA system upon request.

Security Director Chuck Mims said he supported using the barcode systems because it would help alleviate traffic congestion in the guest lanes and also would provide better access control since barcodes can be 'turned off.'

Zielsdorf responded that the barcode is not a perfect sys-

"I don't think issuing barcodes will alleviate all problems. We don't get high flow through the barcode lane to begin with. No doubt it would be faster, but traffic periods will still be a problem," said Zielsdorf.

However after going around the table, the Board seemed to favor Mims suggestion and a proposed a \$20 annual fee per year/per vehicle for Westside residents and non-resident members of the Seven Lakes Country Club to use the barcode system — whether by using a programmed-in SLWLA barcode or purchasing a new SLLA barcode

"We are still open to negotiation with the Westside and we're trying to be accommodating," said Treasurer Denny Galford.

In a related discussion, Galford

reported that he was stopped at the Westside gates on Saturday, May 1, and courteously notified by the guard that SLLA windshield stickers would no longer be honored in the near future. Instead, he was told, North and Southside residents would have to be called in the West gates as a guest.

Following the Work Session, The Times contacted SLWLA Security Director John Hoffman and Community Manager Joan Frost for clarification. Both agreed that the guard was mistaken in his statement and that SLLA windshield stickers will continue to be honored for access until a formal decision or agreement is announced.

Recreation

A parental waiver that gives consent for underage children to ride the Association's ponies and horses was recently drafted and is already in use, Cochran reported. Children are prohibited from riding until a signed waiver is on file at the Stables.

The waiver will be included for discussion and a motion to approve as policy at the next Open Meeting, scheduled for May 26.

Cochran also reported that a leased pony has been returned to its owner: all other horses and ponies at the Stables are Association-owned.

A recent safety inspection of the three community playgrounds in Seven Lakes North resulted in over forty work orders, Cochran said. The red slide at Northside Park was removed because of head entrapment issues and the tether ball pole was also removed.

Cochran said she is optimistic that the Northside Pool will open on time but reported that progress has been slow in receiving approval for a proposed grate solution that may comply with the Virginia Graeme Baker Act. Covering the pool drains with grates would be less costly at \$5,000 than replacement, which is estimated at \$8,000; however, Cochran said she will not proceed without a guarantee of approval.



Moore County Schools [MCS] asked for \$27.4 million in county funding -- a 5.4 percent increase over FY 2009-2010, with part of that increase attributable to the expenses associated with opening two new schools: Crain's Creek Middle and West Pine Elementary.

McSwain pulled those new school expenses out of the MCS budget request, along with state mandated increases in retirement and employee health insurance contributions; cut the school budget by three percent; and then added back in the increases needed for new schools and benefits.

The result was a proposed county contribution of \$26.3 million to the schools, a \$604,000

increase over last year, but \$1.15 million less than the schools asked for.

Using a similar strategy on the SCC budget, McSwain proposed \$4.01 million appropriation for the college, \$218,000 less than the school requested.

Salaries frozen; positions cut

For the second year in a row, county employees will see no increase in their paychecks, if McSwain's budget is approved. The manager warned in his budget message that the county will "face the possible loss of well trained, dedicated employees" if the salary freeze continues indefinitely. Other action taken by the Commissioners during the meeting could elim-

inate a longevity bonus for most county employees.

The retirement system that covers county employees is controlled by the state, and will require Moore County to increase its payments into that system by just under \$350,000 in FY 2010-2011. But the success of the wellness clinic the county maintains for employees and a reduction in health insurance claims means the county can reduce its projected expenditures on employee health care by \$607,000 in the coming year.

The Manager's budget recommends eliminating funding for seven positions that are currently funded but vacant, including the county EMS manager, whose responsibilities will be undertaken by current Public Safety Director and former EMS Manager Bryan Phillips. Four positions currently filled will be eliminated, if the manager's budget is approved by the Commissioners.

Deferring vehicles, principal payments

Based on its standard criteria for replacing older vehicles, the county maintenance garage requested twenty-four new ones for FY 2010-2011. But the Manager's budget recommends buy-

ing only nine, while increasing the vehicle maintenance budget by \$12,000 to reflect the higher maintenance cost of older vehicles.

The county expects to pay debt service of \$2.5 million next year to service bonds that will pay for a new public safety building, jail, and administration building. McSwain suggested that expenditure could be cut by \$1.5 million by deferring principle payments for a year, without significantly affecting the payout over the life of the bonds.

The county must open a new section in its construction debris landfill in the coming year, a \$437,000 expense that is included in the manager's budget.

Longevity Bonus Revised

Moore County employees have long benefitted from a longevity

bonus added to their salary once they have served the county for three years or more. During Monday's meeting, the Commissioners revised that system, tying it to performance, in a way that could eliminate the bonus for most employees.

Traditionally, once an employee had served the county for three years, they began to receive a longevity bonus that started at one percent of their total salary. The percentage increased after five, ten, fifteen, and twenty-five years of service, to a maximum of five percent.

The Board of Commissioners reduced funding for the longevity bonus by twenty-five percent in the FY 2009-2010 budget, and voted Monday night to completely overhaul the system, having it apply only to employees



bonus will be a flat payment ranging from \$500 to \$2,500.

Most importantly, payment of the bonus will be tied to the employee's performance, as measured by a new performance evaluation system the county has implemented this year. Employees are given a numerical performance score on a four hundred point scale; only those scoring 300 and above would be eligible for the longevity bonus.

About half of the county's more than 600 employees have been evaluated under the system. Only about ten percent scored above 300, suggesting the new longevity-performance bonus may apply to only a small minority of employees.

Hiring Freeze Suggested

Commissioner Nick Picerno offered a motion during Monday's meeting that would have frozen hiring for all county positions, but his proposal was modified after input from County Manager McSwain.


McSwain argued that a blanket freeze would be "indiscriminate and random," since there is no way of predicting what position might be vacated next, including, perhaps, the county attorney or county manager slots. "There are more effective and constructive ways to cut spending," McSwain said.

Chairman Tim Lea suggested that, rather than freeze all hiring, any new hires be brought before the Board of Commissioners for approval. Picerno agreed and the revised motion passed unanimously.

Other business

In other business during the Monday, May 3 Board of Commissioners meeting, the Board:

- Proclaimed May as Older Americans Month.
- Recognized Commissioner Cindy Morgan for receiving the Tribute to Women award from the NC Federation of Republican Women.
- Called a public hearing for Monday, May 17, at 6:00pm to consider a rezoning request of a 0.39 acre tract on Murdocksville Road to Residential & Agricultural (RA-20).
- Approved the hiring of Laura Williams as Clerk to the Board at a salary of \$40,000.
