# **Board debates gate policy**

Taking one last look at several unresolved issues of three new Direc-

tors later this month, the Seven Lakes Landowners Association [SLLA] Board of Directors met in Work Session on Monday, March 12.

Perhaps the thorniest issue. is what to do about providing Westsiders with access through the North and Southside gates, in light of a new Seven Lakes West Landowners Association [SLWLA] policy that eliminates windshield stickers and no longer provides SLLA members with automatic access through the Westside gates.

"We have a major issue on card games. access to our community," said SLLA President Bob Darr. "What they have done will cause us a problem, in prior to the election that we will have no way to identify their residents at the gate . . . but it seems to me, we, like them, need to assure that people coming in to our community are people that we allow. We need to know who they are and where they are going. We need to take some of their good ideas and decide what to do here."

Darr expressed concern about how decisions will impact traffic at the gate, due to the large number of Westside visitors who frequent the North Clubhouse area for club activities and

"How will this relate to the Fitness Center and bridge players?" asked Darr "Are we going to have to call in every single person who comes in for Project Linus?"

In addition, he told the Board he was looking for input on improving the current barcode policy for SLLA members. Currently, windshield stickers are automatically distributed to members in good standing during the annual registration process; however, barcodes must be purchased. SLLA members are charged a one-time fee of \$15 and Seven Lakes West residents may purchase an SLLA barcode for a \$20 annual fee

The contract will include work on the mailhouse, guardhouse, and, potentially, a redesign of the back gate. Designs and their associated cost estimates will include any necessary infrastructure such as roads, curbs, drainage, and septic, Hoffmann told The Times.

Hoffman said the goal is to have the new mailhouse completed by year-end 2012; the entryway and guardhouse, by year-end 2013.

# **County looks to Robbins for water**

Robbins remains the Moore County Board of Commissioners' preferred long-

term source for bringing more water to the expanding customer base served by Moore County Public Utilities.

During a Tuesday, March 3 special meeting, a majority of the Board agreed that a long-term water solution is needed -- and the most likely source for that would be from the Town of Robbins.

Public Works Director Randy Gould presented the Board with options to meet both ten year and thirty-year

demand projections, explaining that the County will need an additional one million gallons per day in ten years to meet peak demand, and two million gallons per day on top of that to meet the projected demand in thirty years.

The three primary shortterm strategies include: tapping Robbins' reservoir on Bear Creek, drilling more wells, or buying more water from Harnett County -already an important source of purchased water for the County. Longer term, Gould presented two options: tapping the Deep River near Robbins, or drilling more than twenty new wells in the Pinehurst area.



# Council approves principal payment

Lack of serious buyer interest in the Village-owned 160-acre parcel at Wood-

will impact debt service prompted Foxfire Village Finance Director Leslie Frusco to recommend taking \$112,000 from the fund balance to pay down principal on the nearly \$2 million loan.

"We have a two-year agreement with the bank for interest-only payments, but that is really impractical to do," she explained during the Foxfire Village Council meeting on Tuesday, March 13. "In the long run, it will cost the Village more. By making a substantial principal payment — and our analysis is the General Fund can stand it — it would significantly reduce the overall interest and put the Village in a position to more easily handle future payments."

In addition, Frusco said, she is looking at re-amortizing the loan to add five years of payments but reduce the year-to-year note due. And the bank is also lowering the interest rate on the loan to a 15-year municipal rate.

The large undeveloped tract was donated to Foxfire last year in lieu of a \$1.4 million assessment, a figure which represented the lion's share of costs towards the development and paving of the Woodland Circle Extension project.

Offering an update on the property listing, Mayor George Erickson said he met with Realtor Robert Edwards this week and invited him to address the Village Council during a special budget-related work session.

"There has been interest in the property," Erickson said, "but no offers have been

The \$112,000 transfer from the fund balance was approved unanimously.

### Planning and Zoning

Taking the opportunity to publicly address last month's tense debate over minimum lot size requirements in the equestrian zoning district, Councilman Mick McCue land Circle — and how that apologized to Planning & Zoning Chairman Steve Sparks.

"My words and tone at last month's meeting were inappropriate," he said.

And though the Council did not reengage in discussion over six acres versus ten acres, resident MaryAnn Lauer did tackle the subject during public comment. She said that while George Worst's recommendation to maintain the 10-acre minimum was well-educated, she disagreed with his comparison of Foxfire and Middleburg, Virginia.

"We are not Middleburg," she said. "We do not have their lot sizes, and we do not need to live up to those standards.

In another discussion related to Planning & Zoning, Sparks said the committee would be reviewing draft language recommended by the Village Attorney to revise the "clothes line" ordinance.

The Council unanimously approved a zoning inspection services agreement with the Village of Pinehurst. The agreement provides for Pinehurst planning staff to inspect setbacks and other zoningrelated services, for a set fee and using Foxfire Village ordinances as guidelines.

### Rental guidelines approved

In a quick up-and-down motion, without discussion, the Council unanimously approved a new ordinance related to single family residential zoning.

Last discussed during the January work session, the revised definition and ordinance were developed in response to a single family home that was rented by a business and used as dormitory-style housing for six unrelated men. As of Janu-

# Lake House – something for everyone

It's a place for everyone: families, kids, retirees, sports nuts.

Since opening Lake House Bar and Grill in December, owners Danny and Will Bowers have worked hard to make their restaurant just that: a place for everyone.

The father and son team decided to open their bar and grill — located on Grant Street in the Business Village — after noticing that Seven Lakes didn't have a place to stop and grab a burger and a cold drink after a long day on the lake

"We've worked real hard to make this place pretty much the same for kids or for the older people and everybody in-between," Danny Bowers told *The Times*: "A place where someone can come in and sit in and watch the game, or just sit around and talk — and they can get good food."

The initial menu focused on classic sports bar offerings; hamburgers, hot dogs, Reubens and other speciality sandwiches, along with a full complement of appetizers, ranging from fried pickles to chili cheese fries.

But the Bowers are expanding that menu to include blackened tuna steak, pork loin, vegetable medley, blackened chicken salad, and

house salads. The forty-two seat restaurant also boasts a full bar, with draft beer, a wine list, and mixed drinks.

Expanding the menu is just another way of "listening to our customers," said Will Bowers. "We really take that to heart."

Lake House regulars can join the "Mug Club," buying an over-sized eighteen ounce beer mug that is kept chilled at the bar filled with beer anytime it is requested. So far sixteen people have signed up for this service.

The "Mug Club" is all about "trying to build kinship or ownership," explained Bowers, "so that people understand that this is their place."

Adding to the laid back atmosphere at the Lake House is guitarist, Steven Argereow, who performs every Friday.

Five big screen televisions located throughout the space mean there is always something interesting to watch, with a focus, of course, on sports. Lake House has access to all the top televised sports packages, including NFL Full Ticket, ESPN Full Court NCAA basketball, and all the NASCAR races. There's even free wi-fi for those who like to bring along their laptop or tablet.

"We have stuff lined up for everybody," said Bowers, "not just specific age groups." Later this Spring, the action will move outside the restaurant, as Lake House launches an outside concert series called "Seven Lakes After Five."

Every second Wednesday of the month, from April to September, a different band will perform in the parking lot from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm. The admission fee is a nonperishable food item that will be donated to the Back Pack Pals Program in Moore County.


"We have been here three months and have appreciated everyone who walks in the door," said Danny, "We'll bend over backwards to make their experience here good."

# SLLA Board approves FY 2013 Budget

The Fiscal Year 2013 Budget, along with two changes to the Seven Lakes

Landowners Association [SLLA] fee structure, won unanimous approval from the Board of Directors during the SLLA February 29 Open

The approved budget anticipates \$1.37 million in revenues, balanced against \$1.08 million in expenses, plus a \$294,400 transfer to reserves.

The Association will begin the year with \$500,000 in restricted reserves — set aside for road paving projects and state-mandated dam repairs — in addition to \$427,000 in unrestricted reserves, of which \$236,000 is set aside for emergencies.

Based on recommendations gleaned from the Reserve Study, anticipated capital projects for the coming year include installation of a toe drain at Sequoia Dam, exterior renovation at the stables, replacement of the bulkhead

at Sequoia Island, and repairs and mechanical updates to the pool. However, SLLA Treasurer Conrad Meyer quickly pointed out the individual capital projects have not yet been approved by the Board and would exceed the available unrestricted reserve funding, if all were completed at their estimated costs.

"These projects were copied and pasted straight out of the Reserve Study," Meyer said. "We now have the Long Range Planning [LRP] Committee and they are working on what is the right order of projects. We left them in [the budget] as placeholders. Any

of those projects, going forward, will have input from the LRP and be voted on by the Board."

### Income up slightly

During a brief summary of income anticipated in the FY 2013 Budget, Meyer said historically low interest rates will continue to have a negative impact on income from investments. A \$12,000 budgeted increase in dues income is largely the result of a recent decision to no longer charge renter's dues; thus, landlords will no longer receive a rebate on half of those dues. In a related motion later in the

meeting, the Board unanimously approved an annual \$100 administrative fee that will be assessed on renters.

In a second fee-related motion, the Board approved an amendment to Rule 8.5.3, moving the due date for marina slip fees from April 1 to May 1.

Turning attention to anticipated expenditures, Meyer's noted a slight increase in administration and salaries, with some funding set aside for potential two percent merit raises — and also for an additional half-time position in the maintenance department.

"We recognize that we do need to spend some more money on maintenance," he said, "but we are also looking at all areas for possible reductions."

Under recreation, Meyer said horse feed expenses were up \$3,000; and, under security, the Association will save approximately \$5,000 next year due to the recently approved security contract with The Budd Group.

The Yard Debris Site was singled out as an expense problem area.

# **Board approves Land Use Plan Vision Statement**

The Vision Statement for Moore County's 2012 Land Use Planning Steering Com-

mittee will be: "Establish a consensus which uses the Community input process to develop a Land Use Plan which meets the needs of today's citizens and future generations, and acknowledges the diverse areas within the County. The Land Use Plan shall be User Friendly, Business Friendly, Concise and Reduce Regulations."

The Board of Commissioners approved the statement, prepared by Planning Director Debra Ensminger, during their Tuesday, March 7 regular meeting.

Planning Board Chairman Robert Hayter, who will also chair the Steering Committee, told the Commissioners he is ready to get the process moving: "[I'm] appreciative of this moment to kick this off," he said. "I am ready to go to work."

### **VIPER Decision Tabled**

After hearing a presentation from Assistant County Manager Ken Larking pertaining to VIPER funding, the Commissioners tabled the proposal until it can be reviewed by the Emergency System Advisory Committee [ESAC] at their Thursday, March 29 meeting.

The Board has held two special meetings aimed at finding a way that the County can defray the estimated \$5 million that new radios and other equipment will cost. The county has selected the VIPER system, developed and maintained by the State Highway Patrol, in order to meet a Federal Communication Commission requirement that emergency communications be migrated to a narrowband radio system.

Chief Sheriff's Deputy Neil Godfrey told the Board that waiting for the ESAC review should not affect municipal budget planning.

Chairman Caddell said he

wants to make sure each municipality is getting what is needed. "Make sure it's fair to every everybody," said Caddell, "looking at necessities, and not the wants."

County Manager Cary McSwain told the Board that additional grant funding may be found to help pay for the transition. As additional grant money comes in, Larking said, it will be deducted from the overall cost of the project.

### **Road Work**

The Commissioners approved a request by Planner Robert Farrell to close a 0.82 mile portion of Airport Road -- the remainder of the right-of-way left over when Airport Road and NC Highway 22 were realigned, creating the traffic circle near the Moore County Airport. This portion of the road is no longer paved, and all adjacent landowners have signed a petition in favor of the closure.

The North Carolina Department of Transportation [NCDOT] notified Moore County in November 2011 that the road has been deleted from the state maintenance system. Once the road has been closed, the property will be deeded to the property owners adjacent to the road.

The Commissioners approved a petition to ask NCDOT to add a 0.205 mile section of Riverbend and Autumn Drives to the state maintenance system. The petition will now move forward to the NCDOT.

In other planning business, the Board voted to allow the County Manager and Community Development Planner, instead of the Commissioners Chairman, to sign documents related to Community Development Block Grants [CDBG]. In some instances it is more efficient and expedient to have multiple persons authorized to sign off on the

documents.

### **Public Works**

The Board approved Solid Waste Division Manager Chad Beane's application for a \$100,000 NC Department of Environment and Natural Resources [NCDENR] Community Waste Reduction and Recycling Grant. The grant would pay for the construction of a recyclable materials transfer station.

The grant application requires a match of \$17,800 in local funds. Beane told the Board that he is asking the Village of Pinehurst to help meet the local match. If an agreement can't be reached between the Village and County -- the two largest contributors of recyclable material -- then the appli-

cation will be withdrawn.

Currently, recyclables are shipped out of the County to be processed. Beane said a local facility would "consolidate loads and save on freight."

Other Business during the Commissioners' Tuesday, March 6 meeting included:

# Spence seeks no increase in local funding

The Moore County Board of Education School Board will request no

increase in county funding for Fiscal Year 2013, if its members accept the recommendation of new Moore County Schools [MCS] Superintendent Dr. Aaron Spence.

Spence advised the Moore County Board of Education during their Monday, March 12 meeting against requesting additional local funding for the coming year, instead seeking the same \$25 million the County provided for the current year.

"In times where the state revenues decreased, in times of recession, and in times where the Federal government felt it needed to step in — it is important for us to recognize and value the support of our Commissioners in providing us with level funding," explained Dr. Spence, "These have been difficult revenue times, and they have stepped up to the plate."

As proposed, the Superintendent's budget will meet three "top priorities" including: closing the achievement gap, focusing on literacy in K-12, and ensuring students are ready for the future.

Spence also recommended no further cuts in the number of MCS employees, whose ranks have been thinned by 170 positions over the past four years, due to state cutbacks in school funding.

Spence told the Board that he expects additional state cuts in the coming year, but those costs should not affect the number of school employ-

Among the changes that Spence is recommending for next year is the elimination of "combination classes" that put two grades into one classroom. He also proposes providing teacher assistants in every kindergarten and first grade classroom to help meet literacy goals.

And, while there is currently no funding available

for the effort, Spence asked the Board to consider creating a vision to incorporate more technology into the schools.

"This is not about computers for computers sake," he said. "Our students learn this way."

The proposed budget won praise from School Board members during Monday night's meeting.

"I think you listened to us and the community and you are right on target," said Dr. Lorna Clack.

Other items that Spence said he expects to address after additional research include: year-round schools, school start times, school safety, and support for the common core and essential standards.

The Board of Education will hold a public hearing on the proposed MCS budget on Monday, April 2. The School Board will present the budget to the County Commissioners on Tuesday, April 17.

### **Career and College Promise**

Board members were briefed on the Career and College Promise program by Associate Superintendent Kathy Kennedy and Dr. Eric Porter. The program allows MCS high school juniors and seniors to enroll in community college, tuition free, to gain college credits.

Students can use the program to earn up to 30 college credits before graduating from high school. Sandhills Community College [SCC] is following available: Business working with MCS on the dual enrollment initiative.

Currently, 105 students are enrolled in the program, which requires a 3.0 GPA. Six career paths currently available include: Civil Engineering, Collision and Refinishing, Criminal Justice, Digital Media Technology, Culinary Arts, and Emergency Medical Science.

For students whose plans include enrolling in a fouryear college, SCC has the

and Economics, Engineering and Mathematics, Humanities and Social Science, Life and Health Science.

# Landowners ask about impact of UDO

A second set of notification letters regarding the proposed Unified Development Ordi-

nance [UDO] drew a small crowd to the Moore County Planning Board meeting on Thursday, March 8.

accepted Chairman Robert Hayter's invitation to speak; instead, most simply nodded their heads in agreement that the information presented on rezoning changes in the proposed UDO had satisfied their concerns.

Developed and discussed at length over the last year, the UDO aims to is to unify the zoning ordinance, subdivision regulations, and flood damage prevention ordinance into a single, user-friendly document, Hayter explained. As part of the revisions, approximately 249 properties will be rezoned into more established categories.

For example, the vast majority of rezoned properties, representing 178 of the parcels, will change from Rural Business to Neighborhood Business, with all current uses still permitted.

Jeff Marcus asked how the

water or wildlife habitat concerns, with Garner responding that there are no regulations added that would affect either of those issues.

"From a philosophical standpoint, our intent is, to the fullest extent possible, to comply with all existing regulations," Hayer explained. "It is not our intent to harm the land."

Chad Nelson asked if the revised UDO would make it any easier or any harder to expand an existing business. An owner of an automotive repair shop located near the

"Because my last name Sometimes one little letter starts with the letter S, that is how I ended up at Duke," he explained.

> But how he became a cheerleader for his alma mater is another story entire-

It was back in high school in Indiana that Stancik first cheered. A natural athlete and accomplished gymnast, his favorite event was performing giant swings on the high bar. However, his career aspirations — like so many others at the time — were forever altered with the onset of World War II.

Stancik volunteered for the Marine Corps and was sent to boot camp on the West Coast, where he later applied for the V12 program in preparation for Officer Candidacy School.

"I was very lucky. I was picked," he said.

The V12 program was conducted in two-year stints at colleges and universities across the country — with students divvied up depending on the first letter of their last name. Stancik, with the first letter of his name toward the latter part of the alphabet, was enrolled at Duke Unirigorous physical program of strength testing, he first attracted the attention of his V12 instructors and was invited to teach gymnastics

As part of the military's and, shortly thereafter, he also caught the attention of the cheerleading coach.

and three women in 1943 and 1944, and Stancik introduced tumbling into the sport during his tenure.

In May 1945, he was commissioned and shipped to the Pacific Theatre.

"Fortunately, the War was ending when I got there," he told The Times. "Otherwise, I would not be sitting here talking to you."

He returned to Duke and completed his undergraduate and graduate degrees, in 1948 and 1949, respectively, and later was called back to active duty to serve during the Korean Conflict.

By the late 1970's he was working as a consultant when his son, who had a dual career as a minister and a builder, met the daughter of Seven Lakes developer, Fred Lawrence

Glen Stancik settled in the area and built the Fitness Center, the first expansion to The Chapel in the Pines, and various other commercial and office buildings in Seven Lakes. By 1985, his parents joined him in the communi-

"You could say we've been here since the beginning," Stancik said.

Sadly, Stancik lost his wife in 2007, but has found love again with Robin Tabor, a retired teacher and former resident of Seven Lakes West,

who was also widowed.

"She is an addicted bridge player: that's how we met,' Stancik recalled. "And I took a quick shine to her. We have a lot in common. We both have Master's degrees from Duke; and we have a much loved and expansive family of children, and grandchildren and great-grandchildren."



### Infrastructure

Infrastructure Director John Goodman reported that he continues to move forward several projects, including work at Longleaf pond number 2, mapping out all the culverts on side roads throughout the community, installing a metal storage building, removing curbs at Lake Auman, and patching Longleaf Drive over the dam.

Two items that will have to wait until next year due to budget constraints include the repair of side road culverts and work on Longleaf pond number 3, which will require the installation of a spillway pipe due to "significant seepage," which has caused sink holes to form, and the second to repair culverts.

To date, half of the sideroad culverts on side-roads have been mapped out, Goodman said. "Of those, two need to be replaced.

The remainder of the culverts will be mapped out and a price for repairs brought to the Board at a later date.

Noting the large number of infrastructure upgrades recently completed throughout the community, ARC Director Hoffmann told the Board, "We raised the dues significantly a couple of years ago, and one of the main reasons is we knew we had a crumbling infrastructure . . . I think it bears out that

those increases were necessary . . . to keep the community safe, secure, and attractive."

### **Lake and Dam**

Recounting a recent meeting with Dam Engineer Dr. Dan Marks, Lake and Dam Director Adam Wimberly reported that the "dam is in the best shape it's ever been

A recent surprise inspection by the NC Department of Environment and Natural Resources [NCDENR] noted two minor issues, Wimberly said, including erosion at a sub-drain outlet and excessive embankment seepage —which proved to be only rain water.

Marks will be issuing a certificate of completion for the work done at the lower pond dam, Wimberly added.

In other Lake and Dam news, Secretary Jane Sessler asked Wimberly to address track marks from an ATV on the terraces of the dam which have caused damage to that area.

Safety and Security Director Jim McCarthy said he has some leads on who is driving over the terraces —something that is prohibited, as is any use of ATV's on the roads in Seven Lakes.

Wimberly will pen a letter that will be sent to the Morris Drive and Bainbridge, area as well as to Morgan Wood, to gather additional information. Those responsible for the damages will be fined accordingly to recoup costs borne by the SLWLA.

### **Treasurer's Report**

Cash disbursements for the month of February were \$367,400, reported Treasurer Don Freiert. "Significant" disbursements for the month included: \$169,000 for the railroad crossing, \$42,000 to Hussey Construction for work on the Johnson Point boat slips, \$7,000 to Marks Enterprises for engineering services, and \$91,500 to Atkinson Infrastructure for work at the lower pond dam.

During February a CD was called by Harris Bank for \$100,000; the funds have been reinvested in a step-up program at Wells Fargo Bank, Freiert reported. Another callable CD for \$100,000 has also been called as of the beginning of March and will be reinvested in a step-up program at Harris Bank.

#### Other Business

Other business conducted during the SLWLA on Tuesday, March 13 included:

- The Board unanimously approved revisions to Chapter 6 of the rules and regulations as first proposed by Sessler on behalf of the Amenities Committee on February 14.
- The Board approved the new variance process and application as first proposed on February 14 by ARC Director John Hoffmann.





our budget on that, for a variety of reasons," Meyer explained, "but we believe we are getting the best bang for our buck. We may need to recognize that it may take \$40,000 to get rid of [acceptable yard materials], but please do not throw construction debris or plastic there. It costs us huge amounts of money to get rid of it."

Under management expenses, Meyer noted this is the third year of the Talis Management Group contract, and the budget includes an anticipated \$5,000 increase per the original agreement.

However, with inflation up and homeowner's dues for operational expenses at a stagnant level since 2006 that is, not including the house management and

\$100 dues increase specifically reserved for road paving and state-mandated dam repairs — Meyer projected transferring approximately \$71,000 to reserves in FY 2014 versus this year's anticipated transfer of \$160,000.

"That is the bad news on this," he said.

### **Outsourcing questioned**

"Are we paying too much dues or are we spending too much? And do we have a management system in place that can service the community?"

During public comment, Southsider William Lindsay quizzed the Board on these two questions and cast a skeptical eye at previous decision-making that moved the Association away from inmaintenance staffing in favor of outsourced contracts.

Reviewing the past few years, Lindsay noted the Community Manager was forced to resign, and given a payout of \$75,000 in consulting fees, in favor of a management company and an outsourced maintenance contract. Arguing that this decision placed Talis as the "middle man" and "the one that was making money," he recommended returning to an independent manager who would personally oversee an in-house administrative and maintenance staff.

"Let's get back our old management system that will give us a manager that will follow our direction," he said. "We need a system that works. I see work that needs to be done; and, the way we are

now, we don't have a system to do it."

SLLA President Bob Darr responded that there are various committees looking into many of the issues Lindsay

"The Board before us made decisions and Boards to follow us will have to make decisions," Darr said. "But many of the things you brought up we are looking at. There are (See "SLLA," p. 17)



a number of things you've said that I don't agree with and some other things that I do agree with. But, overall, one of the functions of the Board is finding the best solutions, and that is an ongoing process."

In particular, Darr thanked Lindsay for his input and encouraged the community to do likewise.

"We would like to hear from all of you," he said. "We may not always agree, but we want to hear input from the community."

Director Bud Shaver also responded to Lindsay's comments and offered some background into the past Board's deliberations.

"Did we make the right decision on the former Community Manager?" Shaver asked rhetorically. "Yes."

Recalling that he ran for the Board for the express purpose of removing previous manager Dalton Fulcher, from his position and to improve the maintenance department, Shaver said the consulting fee was offered to avoid an age-discrimination lawsuit.

Regarding maintenance decisions, Shaver said he was opposed to outsourcing, but said he is pleased that several former Association employees are working for Davenport Landscaping and, in his opinion, are better off now.

In response to Lindsay's concern about finances, Shaver said the Association has not had a dues increase used to pay operational expenses since 2006.

"You are still paying what you paid then for the same services," Shaver explained. "The Board has done everything we can to cut down costs. Many things you said are true, but other things need clarification."

### Lot combination policy

Codifying a long-held but never formally established policy, the Board unanimously approved language that would clearly define the criteria and procedures for combining residential lots. The policy also clarifies how dues will be assessed if a property owner opts to un-combine those lots at some future date.

"Essentially this policy is what has been historically known around here, but not written down," explained Treasurer Meyer.

Owners of lots that were previously approved for combination but have never been properly recorded with Moore County will be given a grace period to complete that transaction. Failure to do so within the ninety-day grace period will result in dues being assessed for the second lot.

### **Election & Annual Meeting**

The SLLA Annual Meeting and election of the Board of Directors will be held Sunday, March 25 at 3:00 pm, at West End Elementary. All landowners are encouraged to attend and also to vote in the upcoming Board election.

"When people vote it shows that they care about what is going on around here," said Darr.

The meeting has been revised slightly, with Directors providing summary reports and heavy emphasis placed on volunteer recognition.

"This has been a great year of people volunteering to help us do what we need to do on this Board and working in committees," Darr said. "We want the Annual Meeting to be a chance to thank all of these folks."

### **Finance**


The goal of the SLLA Finance Committee is to improve some area of Association finances each month, and. SLLA Treasurer Meyer reported, the panel has made significant progress on a wide variety of issues.

On annual billing procedures, he said, the team dis-





been completed, we will turn much of our attention to looking for ways to reduce our costs," said Meyer. "If anyone has any ideas, please contact me, [Community Manager] Alina [Cochran], or one of the other Finance Committee members."

Also addressing financial issues, Cochran said the current budget is on target with the exception of two weeks of security services charges for January that will be reflected in the February financial statement, as well as some extra supply expenditures under Maintenance that are related to work at the boat storage area.

### **Surplus auction**

A pick-up truck, a sailboat, and several boat trailers are among the list of surplus items being auctioned by the Association.

All items may be viewed at the Yard Debris Site in Seven Lakes North and are being sold "as is." Bids must be received by April 2, offers should be mailed to SLLA, Attention Alina Cochran, 501 Seven Lakes North, West End, NC 27376.

### Sequoia Island bulkhead

Reiterating the unanimous recommendation of the Lakes & Dams Committee that the the entire bulkhead at Sequoia Island should be repaired, Director Don Fentzlaff requested the Board's blessing on the project.

In previous discussions, questions have been raised over the anticipated costs for the work, with some suggesting that repairs were only needed at specific areas on the bulkhead. However, Fentzlaff has consistently maintained that the entire bulkhead should be replaced — and sooner rather than later.

"We took a close look and determined that the area that looks good is in pretty bad shape," he said. "There has been quite a bit more damage that is apparent from just four months ago [when bulkhead inspected previously]. The Lakes & Dams opinion is the whole thing should be repaired."

SLLA President Darr agreed with his assessment.

"A month ago, I said I don't think we should replace the whole thing, Darr said. "When we went out and inspected it, I was amazed. Quite frankly, I had to change my opinion."

Darr noted that planks are bowing out from the island and anticipated that, within a short period of time, the bulkhead would fail entirely.

"It will be gone, and we'll start to lose the island," Darr said. "The rest of it [bulkhead] is going and it is going quickly."

Responding to questions about the value of the island, Fentzlaff noted it was heavily used in the Summer by recreational boaters, and Darr said the island and its lighthouse were, historically, a signature landmark frequently included in marketing materials for the community.

Darr also said the bulkhead discussion was a good example of how capital expenditure decisions will be handled in the future.

"One of the things we have been talking about is that a committee's recommendation will come before LRP," Darr explained. "They will have a discussion and come to the Board with their recommendation. We'll see how that goes."

### **Lakes and Dams**

All of the pumps that are being used to evenly distribute water between the various community lakes are operational, reported Fentzlaff. In addition, boards to gauge exact lake levels have been installed.

"From that figure, we will

be able to calculate how many hours or days we'll need to pump to bring the level back up," he explained, though he noted that lakes with a fire department pick-up line have a predetermined minimum level that must be maintained.

In addition, water testing will be conducted on each lake to establish base line numbers for oxygen saturation, e coli, chemical analysis, clarity, and temperature. The frequency of the tests will vary according to the type of test and need.

### **Community Standards**

As of the end of March, there are fifty outstanding cases under review by the Community Standards Committee, reported Director Bob Racine.

"We are trying to clean up some past cases, and we are getting some resistance from [chronic] violators," he said.



"When we bring an issue to their attention, they are getting unfriendly, but we will continue to enforce standards as best we can to make this community as best we can without being persnickety."

#### Recreation

With only a handful of active committee volunteers and a poorly attended Town Hall meeting held in February to discuss events and programming, Director Racine described the current state of the Recreation Committee as disgusting.

"Nobody wants to help," he said. "We are discussing major activities planned for the coming year, and we need volunteers to make it happen. If people don't want to get involved, we won't be able to have the activities."

The Recreation Committee meets the first Wednesday of the month at 9:30 am. All interested residents are invited to participate. If you are unable to attend the meeting, but would like to volunteer for activities, please contact Bob Racine

The annual Easter Egg

Hunt and party will be held Saturday, April 7. Volunteers are needed to help stuff candy eggs on Thursday, April 5 at the SLLA offices, from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm, and also to assist with games and refreshments from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm on Saturday.

### **Architectural Review**

The Architectural Review Board approved three new roof projects, a concrete walkway, two screened-in porches, and a two-story room addition, reported Director Fentzlaff. The committee also denied one application.

"We are considering some changes in regards to rules on pumping sewage from one property to a remote location to make it a little stricter and also more readily visible [in the rules book]," he said.

### Reserve Study

With three new candidates joining the Board of Directors in March, Director Shaver requested the outgoing members should turn over their copies of the Reserve Study.

'They will then have the same report as the rest of the Board when they take office," he said. "I have done all that I can."

Looking ahead, he recommended the areas of roadway identified for fatigue and tree root damage may need more than one contractor to accomplish the work.

"What is important is we need to know what the contractor will use to replace what he digs up and make sure it meets the standards we're going to need," Shaver explained.

### Security

GPS tracking devices are now installed at various locations throughout the community — including the mailhouses, debris site, and Northside Clubhouse — and will be used to log the rounds of roving security patrols.

"Instead of just a written report, we now have a means to know that they have looked at an area," Director Andy Lowe explained.

In other security discussions, Lowe reported there was an issue with the DVR recording device but the motion-sensitive camera is now back in operation at the Yard Debris Site.

Northsider Les Sommers questioned the Board about

reciprocal gate access Seven Lakes West, and Darr responded that the issue would be discussed at the upcoming March Work Session.

### Other business

In other business on Wednesday, February 29, the SLLA Board:

- Approved the use of Lake Echo for the 2012 NC Open Water Swim, to be held June 1-2.
- Heard a report from Director Bruce Keyser, Jr. that grounds are being wellmaintained by Davenport Landscaping. Keyser said the addition of a half-time employee to the maintenance department will help out tremendously.
- Heard a recommendation from Director Shaver for the LRP to investigate the

previous Board's suggestion to relocate the swimming beach at Sequoia Point to the opposite side, a location which would provide a safer recreation area and additional space for an expanded marina. In a related discussion, it was suggested that the horseshoe pits should also be located further away from the beach

# Can we heal the division in Seven Lakes?

have been considering a move to Seven Lakes in the next year or two. We have been reading The Seven Lakes Times and enjoy your column. We believe that if we do make the move, we will enjoy worshipping at the Chapel in the Pines. Recently, we have become concerned about what appears to be a division between Seven Lakes West and the rest of the community. Can you enlighten

**Question:** My wife and I us and advise us on this?

Response: Many of us throughout all three areas of Seven Lakes (North, South and West) share your concern. We believe that growing tension and distrust discourages good people like you from moving here and actually deflates property values in all parts of the commu-

The problem appears to be twofold. Apparently, there is a small group of Seven Lakes West citizens who want to stop the free-flow of visitors between the areas.

Consequently, they are establishing regulations that will make it more difficult for people from the North and

South sides to get through the West side gates, unless they are especially invited and cleared by a Westside resident who will sponsor the visitor and assume responsibility for the visitor's behavior while on the property. Regular visitors may purchase a barcode if they are sponsored and their good behavior is guaranteed.

Human nature being what it is, this has caused members of the land owners' board on the North/South side to consider retaliation by instituting similar regulations.

All of this is driving a wedge between the two boards and subsequently creating bad feelings in the entire community.

The Chapel in the Pines strives to serve the entire

community, with members and congregants living in every section. Easy egress and communication is crucial for our ministries of pastoral care and outreach. The same is true for other churches whose ministers live in one of the Seven Lakes communities.

Incorporation of all three communities and the business area into one town has been floated as an idea, without much positive response. The rising cost of roads and infrastructure in all areas and the prospect of claiming \$2 million a year in sales tax and fee revenues may hasten the reconsideration of this

possibility. But, since effective incorporation would require opening up all the roads, it would take a small miracle to bring it about at this time.

In my past life, I was also a registered mediator, and I have seen mediation bring people together to resolve what appeared to be irresolvable problems. I propose that the two landowners' boards or their authorized representatives sit down with a mediator, air their concerns and reach a solution that will heal any past wounds and reunite the Seven Lakes community.

If we do not do this, I fear that property values will continue to fall and the dream of a strong and united Seven Lakes will fade into fear and oblivion.

I do hope and pray that you will decide to come and help us unite.

# West Side's dues 'parity' unfair to lot owners

Dear Editor:

This is a letter sent to Seven Lakes West Landowners Association President Mick Herdrich.

Dear Mr. Herdrich:

My wife and I have been following with interest the debate regarding the intent to equalize lot assessments between vacant lots and those with homes constructed on them. This letter shall serve to place our objection to the proposal on the record.

We purchased our first lot in Seven Lakes West in April, 1980 and purchased an adjacent lot in the 1990's. Our intention was to eventually retire to Seven Lakes and build a home on one of the lots. We have watched (often with dismay) as the community as promised when we first purchased our lot evolved from one unified entity to two separate and distinct neighborhoods divided by

the highway. It certainly is not the same concept which first attracted our attention and caused us to recommend Seven Lakes to a number of our friends who moved there over the years.

Several times after we purchased our lots we paid special assessments for road paving and other work as developers came and went and we did so without question since those items clearly improved the community as a whole and increased the value of our land. Between the two lots we have paid close to 50 years worth of monthly assessments, but have used the roads in Seven Lakes West perhaps two dozen times and have never had the opportunity to use any of the non-infrastructure services enjoyed by homeowners. Yet, we are now being asked to pay the same amount in monthly assessments as those who drive

the roads everyday, use Johnson Point, West Side Park, recreation activities, and security gates on a regular

In a recent issue of The Times, the statement was made that vacant lots should be built up and it is not unusual for communities to require owners to build within two years. Had this been the rule when we purchased our first lot there never would have been a West Side as it took many more than two years for the dam to be constructed, the lake filled, and the roads completed. Frankly, if you conducted a survey I'm quite certain that the majority of owners would agree that having some vacant lots spread throughout the community actually makes it a nicer place to live than having a home on every single lot.

We recognize that those who own lots without homes have become the minority. It is unfortunate that those who are now in the majority (or at least those in control of the Board) seem to have decided that it is now time to pass off some of the costs of their full time enjoyment of Seven Lakes West to others who are not able to enjoy those same benefits at this time, but have willingly paid a fair portion of the community costs over the years.

If you are honestly concerned because the governing documents do not provide for a bifurcated dues structure despite more than 30 years of use of such a structure, then we suggest you propose an amendment to the governing documents to be voted upon by the membership. Such a bifurcated structure is not at all unusual in a community such as Seven Lakes West and such a change would not the first time the governing documents were revised.



ary, the lease on the shortterm rental had expired.

As approved, the new ordinance offers more substantial in 1980. I am concerned the guidance for property owners who opt to rent their home. Specifically, the ordinance limits the total number of unrelated individuals that may occupy a home; place a 120-day restriction on the total number of days, per year, that a home can be rented on a short-term basis by non-family groups; and restricts long-term rentals to those satisfying the new definition of "family."

A complete copy of the revised ordinance is available at the Foxfire Village office and will be posted on the community website.

### **Long Range Planning**

With the newly-approved Long Range Plan [LRP] in hand, the Long Range PLanning Committee is actively forming additional subcommittees to develop and implement plans to meet stated objectives, reported McCue.

"For example, looking at some of the objectives for the first year, we have a group looking at water supply and water lines, and another group looking at developing a public relations strategy,' he explained.

Councilman Steve Durham said members of the LRP Committee are enthused and have a good grasp on what is required to move forward.

"This will be an effective planning tool," he said.

In a related discussion on planning, McCue said he is

also concerned about the Village's outdated Land Use Plan.

"This was originally adopted plan is too old and not doing what we need it to do," he said, noting the law requires any municipal planning to be consistent with the adopted Land Use Plan.

### Commercial solicitation

A lengthy discussion over a proposed commercial solicitation ordinance resulted in a chaotic series of motions during Tuesday's meeting; however, in the end, the Council unanimously approved a new ordinance regulating door-to-door solic-

As approved, commercial solicitors must have a permit issued by Foxfire Village and are restricted to daylight hours — specifically, 9:00 am to 6:00 pm or not later than fifteen minutes after sunset, whichever is later. In addition, as part of the permitting process, solicitors will undergo a brief background check to be performed by Foxfire Police Chief Mike Campbell.

The new ordinance will not infringe on student, youth group, or church-related soliciting, as non-profit organizations are exempt from these requirements.

During discussion, Council members asked whether the Village would have any liability if a background check were conducted and a permit approved, but later the solicitor caused problems.

Chief Campbell cautioned

the Council and residents that a soliciting permit should not offer a false sense of secu-

"I am limited to certain information in the database system." Campbell explained. "I am not allowed to do a full background check, unless a person is arrested or we are hiring them. If people see the permit, they will think we must have checked to make sure it is a viable business. We can't guarantee anything; but, at least, I feel we have done our part to run our own checks to make sure they are okay."

Upon Frusco's recommendation, the Council also unanimously approved a \$25 fee to obtain the commercial solicitation permit.

#### **Finance**

Ninety-eight percent of budgeted Ad Valorem taxes have been collected, and diligent effort is ongoing to continue the collection process, reported Finance Director Leslie Frusco

The Council also unanimously approved a \$1,200 budget amendment from the contingency fund to purchase necessary materials for a drop ceiling at the Foxfire Fire station. Labor for the project will be provided by West End Fire Rescue members, who expect that the new lowered ceiling height in the living quarters area will reduce energy consump-

### Water

Councilman Durham reiterated that, if a private well

is requested and approved by permit, the house will be disconnected from the Foxfire Water Department, since North Carolina law specifically prohibits any cross-connection between private and publicly-regulated water.

Speaking to The Times following the meeting, he further clarified that a backflow prevention device will be required for all homes with an irrigation system that utilizes the Village water supply. The ban on private wells is still enforced, except where otherwise permitted by North Carolina law, Durham reported. He added that he supports steps taken by former Director Ed Lauer to draft an exemption that would allow irrigation wells in the equestrian zoned district. A proposed amendment will be reviewed by the Planning & Zoning Committee before it is brought back to the Council for approval.

Also during the water report, the Council unanimously approved a \$2,300 write-off in unpaid water bills for Foxfire Resort & Golf Club, covering May 2010 to May 2011, when the club was

Durham and Frusco agreed that pursuing the debt legally would incur more cost than could be retrieved.

### **Public Safety**

The Council unanimously approved the new Senior Touch Program, which was developed by the Foxfire Police Department to assist elderly residents, and those living alone. West End Fire Rescue personnel have also volunteered to assist with the program.

Foxfire residents who enroll in the program, which is targeted to those who are elderly or live alone, can expect a monthly visit from a uniformed police officer, who will help ensure their emergency information and medical card for first responders is up-to-date; conduct a home safety and security survey; and provide information on available social services. For more information, please contact Foxfire Police at 295-5959.

Finance Director Frusco commended Chief Campbell and the department for developing the Senior Touch Program. "We are a unique community and, as such, our residents have some unique requirements," she said.

As a reminder linked to Daylight Savings Time, McCue recommended residents check or replace the batteries in their smoke detectors and review their fire insurance policy. Foxfire Village is classified as Category 6 for fire protection.

### Streets

A proposed contract for street sign and post replacement work drew concern from Frusco and was ultimately tabled for further discussion at the upcoming budget work session. At issue was a \$7,842 low bid by Sandhills Sign to perform replacement work.

The project itself stems from a federally-mandated program of replacing old or insufficient signs to meet new standards.

Councilman John Eltschlager explained the proposed contract included both new signs and posts, which he felt was more costeffective than reusing the posts.

"It is the most economical way to do it," he said. "If they have to come in and cut the bolts off the post, there may be rust. Also we do not know the condition of the post below ground."

Another advantage of new posts is they would be a uniform material — an eight foot wooden post — and would allow all signs to be installed at the same height.

Mayor Erickson made the motion to table approval of the contract for additional discussion at the work session.

### Other business

In other business on Tuesday, March 13, the Foxfire Village Council:

 Recognized 2nd Lt. Robert Hoyle Upchurch for his heroism and service. A World War II pilot killed in action, his remains were returned to Moore County in 2005, and a delegation from China will join local officials on April 7 to dedicate a memorial to honor him.

Unanimously approved several changes to the fee schedule. Frusco explained that fee levels are determined by the actual costs to the Village. Specifically discussed was a change to zoning request fees to allow for pass-through costs of any legal expenses associated with the request.

In the short term, the quickest and cheapest options are drilling more wells or bringing more water from Harnett County to a pump station on NC Highway 73 -- which would supply the Seven Lakes area.

Gould pegged the cost of seven new wells and related infrastructure at \$5.1 million. Bringing more water from

Harnett County will require \$1.5 million in infrastructure upgrades. By contrast, tapping into Robbins' Bear Creek reservoir is expected to cost nearly \$15 million.

The cost differential seemed to persuade Commissioner Tim Lea that wells and-or Harnett County water might be the best short-term option.

However, Chairman Larry Caddell expressed doubts about relying on more wells for the County's water needs.

"One of the things we talked about all along is being diverse," Caddell said. "My problem with all the wells is if you put all your eggs in one basket. It's cheaper, it would be cheaper on the people, but is it the smartest thing to do?"

"Sometimes the cheapest option ain't the best way to go," said Chairman Caddell. "I am looking for a long-term solution -- not the cheapest."

Commissioner Nick Picerno agreed: "My vision -- and I have said it from day one -we need multiple sources of water."

Gould explained that user rates would increase from \$7 to \$12 per month to pay for any combination of the three projects presented. The current average water and sewer bill (for customers who have sewer) is \$53.51 per month, Gould said.

Currently, almost all of Seven Lakes' water is delivered through a water main that runs along NC Highway 211 from Pinehurst, passing through a booster station near West Pine Middle School. A new NC Highway 73 line would bring water to Seven Lakes from two directions.

"All the developments that we think are going to take place are between Seven Lakes and Pinehurst," Gould said, explaining the rationale for supplying additional capacity in that section of the County.

The idea of using Harnett County water as the shortterm solution seemed to appeal to Commissioners Jimmy Melton, Craig Kennedy, and Tim Lea.

### Robbins in the long term

Longer term, the Commis-

sioners appeared to favor working out a water deal with Robbins, since it would provide an in-County source for water -- and could fuel economic growth in northern Moore County. According to Gould, it would likely take five years to get the Robbins options up and running, at a ten-year cost of nearly \$15 million. The thirty-year project of adding a water intake on the Deep River would add another \$15 million to the total cost

"Any investments we make in the northern end of the County, I think we will see growth -- be it businesses, be it residential developments popping up," said Commissioner Kennedy, "So you need to weigh that in the factor. So you spend money, but you're going to increase property values, increase invest-

"Should we demand that residents purchase them?" Darr asked. "If so, should we charge for them? Or should we give them to residents? We need to come up with a plan to handle it."

Director Bud Shaver agreed that gate access was an important issue but suggested the discussion should be continued by the incoming Board of Directors, following the Annual Meeting.

"Regardless of what Seven Lakes West does, we need to look at what is best for our own community," Shaver said. "I agree with Bob, we need to decide what needs to be done, so we can straighten out some of this stuff that is loose."

Directors Don Fentzlaff and Bruce Keyser, Jr. both spoke in favor of a policy that would require barcodes for members

"I see a significant cost savings if we go to barcode only

and getting rid of window stickers," Keyser said. "Plus the barcodes give us more ability to track who is coming in and out."

He also recommended that SLLA should adopt the Westside policy of having administrative office staff physically attach the barcodes to the corresponding vehicles, so there is no possibility of mis-

Turning to visitor access for meetings and clubs, Director Bob Racine suggested that gate security maintain a roster for each club, which was the procedure at a Florida gated community in which he previously lived.

"They kept lists," Racine said. "That would narrow down the number of names [called in] and save time at the gate."

SLLA Treasurer Conrad Meyer suggested the Board should table the discussion in favor of allowing the new Security Director and his committee to make a recommendation.

"We should not be creating

policy in a Work Session," Meyer said. "This kind of discussion and recommendation should come from the committee level."

Darr agreed with Meyer, but said he did not want to keep kicking the issue down the road.

"We need to start making some well-thought out positions as it relates to this stuff." he said

### Lot combination requests

Several property owners recently submitted requests for lot combination approval, reported Darr.

Most included all necessary paperwork, but one request drew particular interest because the lot has already been combined once before.

"They are now requesting to add a third lot, and our new policy does not allow that," Darr said.

SLLA Treasurer Meyer recommended the lot combination should be approved because the required survey was dated to December 2011.

"It is clear to me this activity

was going on well before we put this policy in place," Meyer said. "It's not like they put this in progress in the last two weeks. It is the fair thing to allow this one."

Responding to Darr's assertion that the new policy does not allow multiple lot combinations, Meyer suggested that a revision to the language of the policy may need to be added to clarify that point. He also suggested adding language that lot combinations will only be approved for SLLA members in good standing.

"The new policy just says the lots must be contiguous or adjacent," he explained.

Community Manager Alina Cochran agreed that combinations should be limited to no more than two contiguous lots, and said it was her understanding the new policy included that restriction.

Meyer reminded the Board that, during a recent lot audit, he discovered several lot combinations that were approved in the past but the deed was never registered in Carthage. Owners of such combined lots will be notified and given a grace period to finalize the action; failure to do so will result in the second lot being billed for annual dues.

However, Board candidate Dave Buckingham asked whether combined lots should be assessed a higher dues rate, noting that such action decreases anticipated revenue.

"Doesn't the tax rate go up for the larger lot? So shouldn't we be charging more dues?" he asked.

Director Andy Lowe responded that dues are not based on the tax rate or the property value. Both Treasurer Meyer and President Darr agreed with Buckingham's point about losing revenue.

"We have wrestled with that, but based upon what (See "SLLA," p. 29)

ment and capital in the County, so those factors have to weigh in also."

Picerno asked the Board to not be "short sighted" when looking at a possible deal with Robbins.

"Robbins needs some help and they are in Moore County," said Picerno, "If some of this is developed, how will that affect the total economics of Moore County?"

"If you want the water, none of these options are going to be free," explained Picerno, "What we need to do -- hopefully as a Board -- is take the time to explore further with Robbins how we might integrate their system into our system -- how we may come up with some creative ways to pay for it in a different way."

The Board made no formal decision during Tuesday's special meeting, but did express the intention to hold talks with Robbins on water issues.

(Continued from page 27) we've done historically, how do you change it?" Darr asked.

### Sequoia Island bulkhead

Director Don Fentzlaff reported that three bids have been received to replace the bulkhead at Lake Sequoia island, including one bid that included the option to replace the cabling system that secures the bulkhead though at an additional cost.

Fentzlaff explained that the current cable is not a single piece, but a series of sections with turnbuckles that can be tightened and adjusted as needed.

"It would be an additional amount of money," he said, "but, in the overall picture, we need to keep in mind that the cost of bulk cable is considerably less."

The total length of the bulkhead is over 500 feet, which is the tipping point for a reduction in price on bulk cable. In addition, the cost of cable varies based on already approved paving whether it is galvanized or stainless steel.

Fentzlaff anticipated the project would take two to three weeks to complete and recommended approving the project now, so the work would be complete before the Summer boating season.

However, President Darr said, while the work itself is necessary, he disagrees with making any hurried decisions involving capital projects.

"We have to put the issue in front of LRP and we will do that," Darr said. "The issue is whether or not that group agrees that we need to do it now, and how it will fit into the discussion of overall expenditures. We don't need to slam dunk this thing in a fast fashion . . . there is still time to get this decision before the LRP."

### **Notification to landlords** of rental dues policy

Property owners of rental houses will be notified in writing of the newly approved policy of charging \$100 in annual rental fees.

Director Bud Shaver recommended that the notice

should include a reminder to landlords that renters' use of amenities is not an automatic right.

"That is a decision the rental owner has to make and whether or not they want to charge additional for that," said Shaver.

The \$100 renter fee is strictly an administrative fee, it has nothing to do with amenities, he clarified.

The Board discussed how to control access if both the landlord and the renter have membership cards, including a suggestion by Dave Buckingham to issue a differently colored pass for renters, but Darr emphasized that restricting access to one or the other would be very difficult to

"It has been brought up as a problem," Darr said, "but I think we're making a hell of a big issue out of something that isn't a big issue."

### S&ME paving contract

Trying to stay on track with work, the Board called a Special Open Meeting immediately following the Work Session to approve a \$5,500 contract to S&ME for expanded engineering work.

Specifically, the contract includes marking those pavement areas already identified as fatigued or with tree root issues and providing specifications for a cement mixture to the underlying subsoil at those locations before any overlay work is done.

"Yes, these are the priority areas, but they didn't define the concrete mix in the [original] contract," explained Director Shaver. "That is what this does. We need to make sure we understand what they will replace those soils with. It is a clarification, because we didn't want to leave that decision up to the contractor but, instead, we tell them what we want there."

Director Lowe spoke in favor of the additional work.

"This is a pay me now or pay me later," he said. "If we put blacktop over poor soil, then we will just have to go back later and redo the work."

When the contract was called for a vote, Racine opposed the motion, stating he was in favor of the contract but did not agree with the procedure of calling a Special Open Meeting to approve the

In other business on Monday, March 12, the SLLA Board:
